Deandre Parks Arraigned on Additional Gun Charge in Connection to Roseville Shooting

Mount Clemens, MI - Today, Deandre Parks, a 19 year old Roseville man was charged and arraigned on an additional gun charge in connection to a shooting near an elementary school in Roseville on Monday, March 6, 2023.

Allegedly, Parks was in possession of the firearm used in the shooting near Steenland Elementary School before the shooting occurred. Earlier this week on Tuesday, March 7, 2023, Deandre Parks was charged and arraigned on Carrying a Concealed Weapon (5 Year Felony.) Parks was arraigned in Roseville District Court by District Court Judge Alyia Hakim. Judge Hakim set a \$5,000.00 personal bond and upon release Parks must wear a GPS tether.

Today, the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office added the charge of Possession of a Firearm in a School Zone (5 Year Felony.) Parks was arraigned in Roseville District Court. The Macomb County Prosecutor's Office requested a \$50,000.00 cash/surety, no 10%, a steel cuff tether, and a mental health assessment from Community Corrections. District Court Judge Alyia Hakim set his bond at \$10,000.00 cash/surety, 10% (\$1,000) with a GPS tether. The Judge denied the request for a mental health assessment. The mental health assessment request is part of Prosecutor Lucido's initiative on gun cases.

If you commit an assaultive gun felony, you end up with a felony, said Lucido. "Now is also the time to require felony gun suspects to get a mental health evaluation as a condition of bond before they get a chance to access another gun."

The defendant's probable cause hearing is scheduled for Wednesday, March 15, 2023 at 8:30 am with his preliminary exam scheduled for Wednesday, March 22, 2023 at 8:30 am.

The Macomb County Prosecutor's office represents the people. We are committed to achieving justice and following the laws of the State of Michigan. All that are accused of a crime are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.
