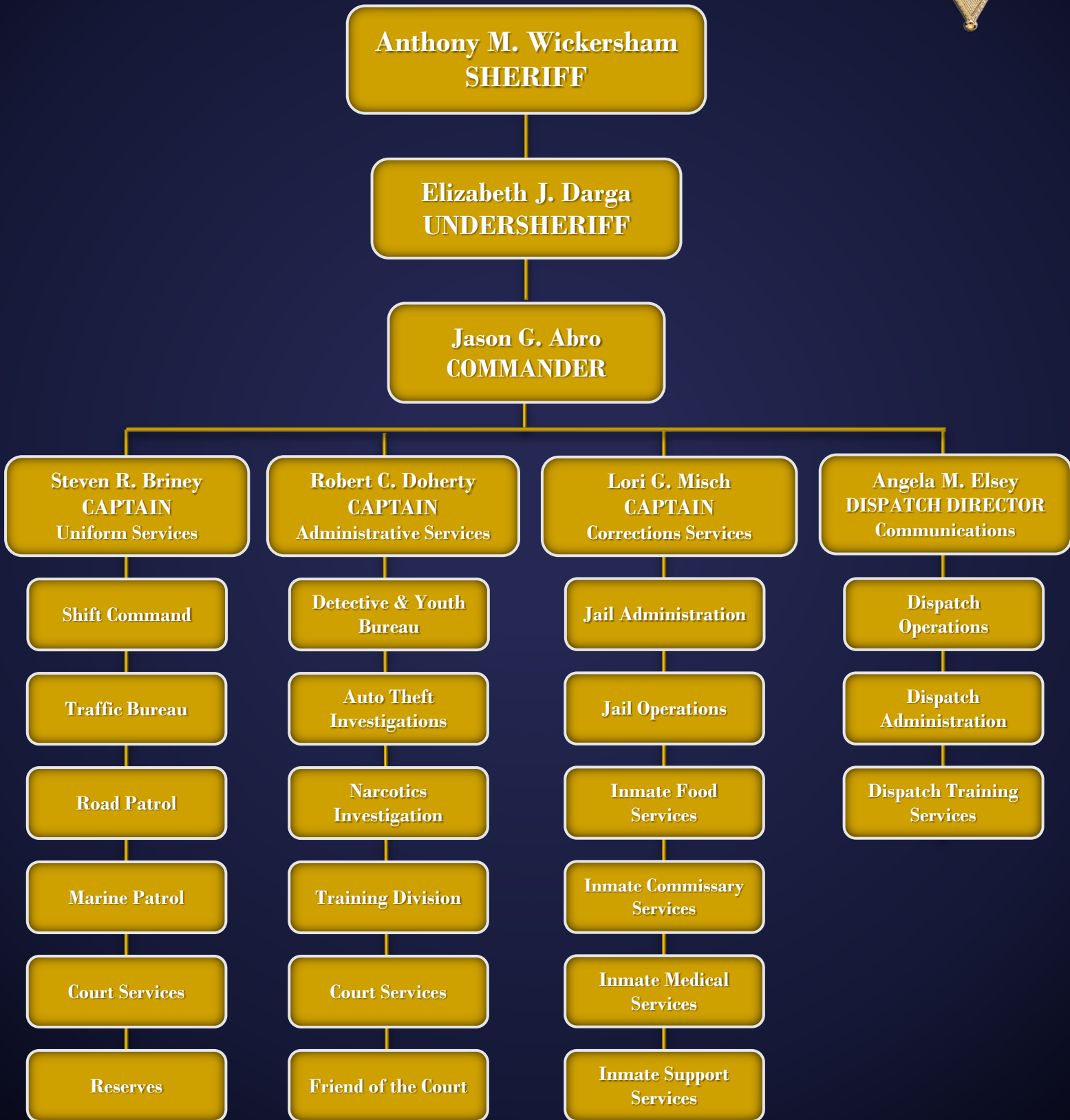

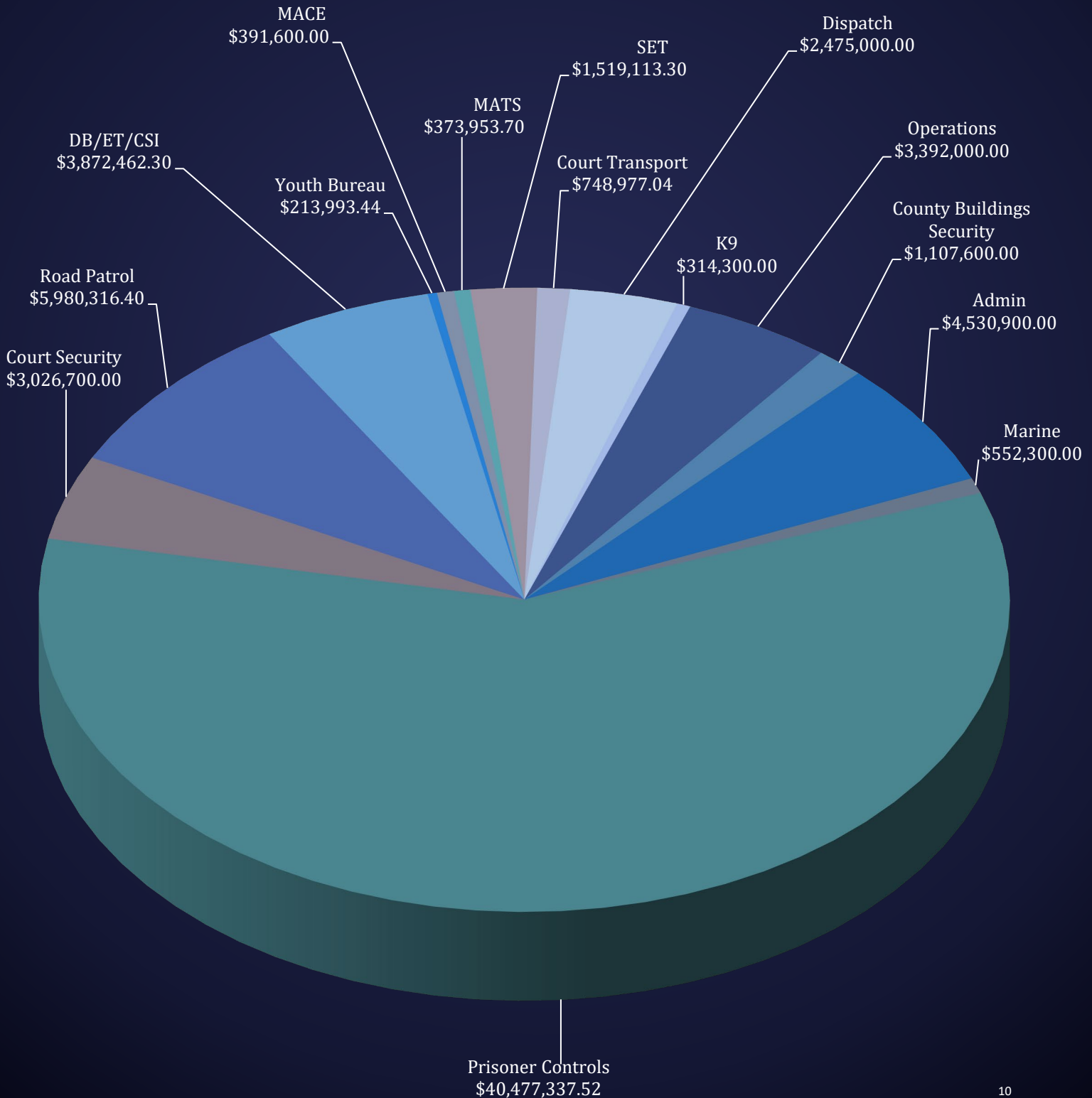

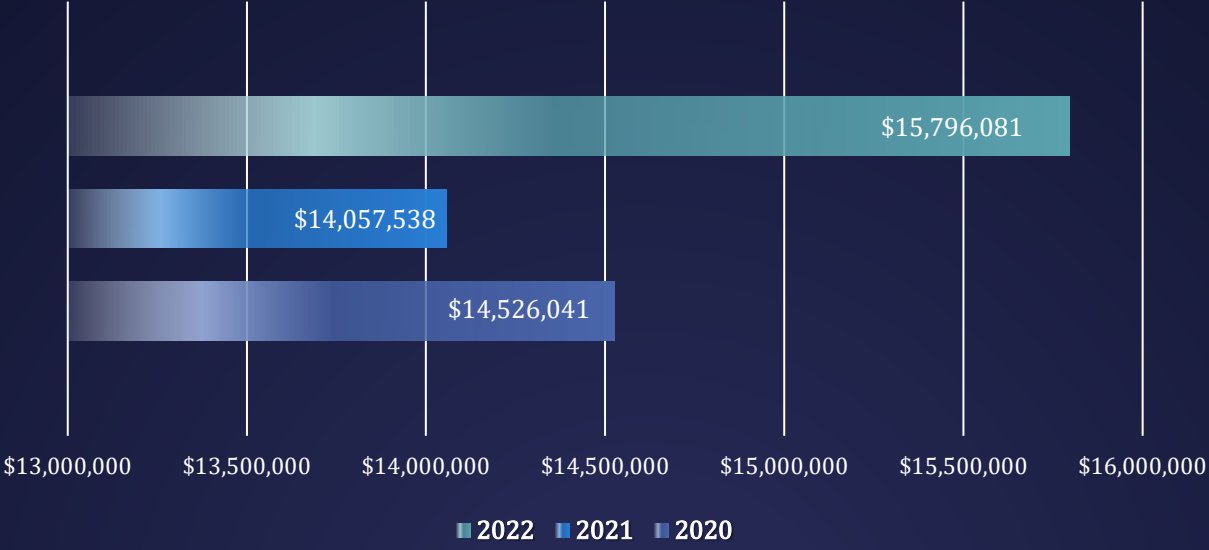

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES



DETECTIVE BUREAU



The Detective Bureau supervisory staff is comprised of one Lieutenant, one Administrative Sergeant, and two team leaders which are Sergeants as well. The total manpower assigned to the Detective Bureau is fifteen, of which there are four supervisors and eleven detectives. Additionally, there is one clerical position assigned to assist detectives. In 2022, a staff change took place at the Lieutenant, Administrative Sergeant, and north-end team leader positions. Also, in the last quarter of 2022, an additional deputy was specially assigned to the Detective Bureau to assist

with background investigations for applicants who have applied for dispatcher, corrections deputy, and deputy.

FRIEND OF THE COURT (F.O.C.)

Three deputies were assigned to FOC Enforcement Unit at the start of 2022. In July of 2022, the unit was reduced to one deputy who is responsible for the safety and security of the facility, its employees, and patrons. Friend of the Court Enforcement Deputies affected 110 arrests/resolutions for bench and other arrest warrants for failure to pay child support in 2022. The total amount of arrearages accounted for those arrests equals \$1,467,324.00.

YOUTH BUREAU SERVICES



The Youth Bureau is comprised of one Investigator, one Assistant Investigator that primarily deals with adult crimes, and seven School Resource Officers (S.R.O.). The S.R.O. Deputies are assigned to the Chippewa Valley, Romeo, and L'Anse Creuse school districts, as well as Merritt Academy located in the Village of New Haven. The deputies and investigators assigned to the Youth Bureau are supervised by the Detective Bureau's North End team leader.



Two MCSO S.R.O Deputies are assigned to the Chippewa Valley School District. Both Deputies are assigned out of Dakota High School but respond and cover the 9th grade center, and all Middle and Elementary School campus' within our contracted patrol areas if needed. These Deputies also patrol Macomb Township in the absence of school functions.

One MCSO S.R.O Deputy is assigned to the Romeo School District. The MCSO Deputy is assigned out of Romeo High School but also covers and will respond to all Middle and Elementary Schools Campus if needed. This Deputy also patrols Washington Township in the absence of school functions.



Two MCSO S.R.O Deputies are assigned to the L'Anse Creuse School District. One S.R.O Deputy is assigned out of High School "Central" located in Harrison Township, and one S.R.O Deputy is assigned out of High School "North" located in Macomb Township. Both S.R.O Deputies also respond and cover all Middle and Elementary Schools within the contracted patrol areas of the district and will assist in any event to assist neighboring Law Enforcement Agencies if needed. These Deputies also patrol Harrison and Macomb Townships in the absence of school functions.

Beginning in the first quarter of 2023, one MCSO S.R.O Deputy will be assigned to Merritt Academy which is a K-12 private District campus located in the Village of New Haven. This Deputy is solely contracted by the School District and remains at the school campus in absence of school functions.

POLYGRAPH



The Polygraph Operator is responsible for conducting polygraphs for MCSO investigators, other police agencies, and the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office as requested. The Polygraph Operator is also requested at times to travel to agencies to conduct polygraphs upon notice. An additional responsibility for the Polygraph Operator is to investigate any criminal act reported within the Macomb County Jail.

EVIDENCE TECHNICIANS



The Evidence Technicians, also known as the Crime Scene Unit consists of 10 Deputy Sheriffs. Eight are assigned to shift work, one as the property officer and one as the Crime Scene/ Crash Reconstructionist. Our crime scene personnel has specialized training in photography, finger prints, blood spatter, shooting trajectories and DNA collection. Our Evidence Technicians also have additional training with the Faro 360 scanner and UAV drones. The Faro Scanner captures/ measures 3D data within a crime scene, allowing for a virtual walk through of the scene by judges, prosecutors, jury's or any Trier of fact. We also merge the additional UAV drone data with the Faro captured data for a brilliant court room presentation.

The Crime Scene unit responded to and processed 2421 crime scene related calls. We deployed our Faro scanner on 39 major crimes scenes. Our personnel and resources were requested by other agencies and were used in various crime scenes for the Macomb County Jail.



SHERIFF ENFORCEMENT TEAM (S.E.T.)



The Macomb County Sheriff's Enforcement Team (S.E.T.) is a team of Macomb Sheriff's Office Detectives who conduct narcotic investigations, execute search warrants, apprehend fugitives from justice, and assist with major criminal investigations. The team is comprised of 13 Sheriff's personnel consisting of 1 Lieutenant, 2 Sergeants, and 10 Detectives. Five Detectives are assigned to various task forces which include the County of Macomb Enforcement Team (C.O.M.E.T.), the U.S. Marshal Task Force (D.F.A.T.), the Drug Enforcement Agency (D.E.A.) – F.A.N.T.O.M., the Federal Bureau of Investigation (F.B.I.) task force, and the Macomb Area Computer Enforcement (M.A.C.E.) team. Members of S.E.T. work with *Crimestoppers*, confidential informants, other police agencies, and tips provided by the general public.

S.E.T. Detectives review daily crime reports and develop information from a wide array of local and statewide sources. All incoming tips are investigated and, whenever possible, criminal cases are developed. S.E.T. members work in an undercover capacity and work varying hours. The Sheriff's Enforcement Team is also available on short notice to investigate crimes where time is of the essence.

DRUG ENFORCEMENT AGENCY (DEA)



One S.E.T detective is assigned full-time to the Federal Anti-Narcotics Team of Macomb (F.A.N.T.O.M.) task force. This investigator develops cases through tips received from the D.E.A. and focuses on lengthy and complex narcotic investigations and/or those that span multiple jurisdictions. In 2022, the D.E.A. reimbursed the Macomb County Sheriff's Office \$7,646.00 in overtime costs.

U.S. MARSHALS - FUGITIVE APPREHENSION



Two S.E.T. Detectives are assigned full-time as task force officers with the U.S. Marshals Service. These detectives are part of a collaborative state and local law enforcement effort to track down and apprehend violent offenders. In 2022, S.E.T. detectives assigned to D.F.A.T. apprehended 123 fugitives from justice and the U.S. Marshals reimbursed the Macomb County Sheriff's Office \$15,701.51 in overtime costs.



F.B.I. VIOLENT CRIMES TASK FORCE



One S.E.T. Detective is assigned to the F.B.I. task force. This Detective is part of a collaborative law enforcement effort that focuses on a vast array of lengthy and complex criminal cases that span within multiple jurisdictions. In 2022, the F.B.I. reimbursed the Macomb County Sheriff's Office \$16,191.62 in overtime costs.



COUNTY OF MACOMB ENFORCEMENT TEAM (C.O.M.E.T.)



One S.E.T. detective is assigned to C.O.M.E.T. This unit is operated by the Michigan State Police and was originally formed in 1982 and our office has been a participant since its inception. The Detective assigned to C.O.M.E.T. is partially funded by the Edward Byrne Federal/Memorial Grant. The federal grant pays one-third of the expense of the Detective and much of the remaining expense is obtained through the forfeiture of assets.

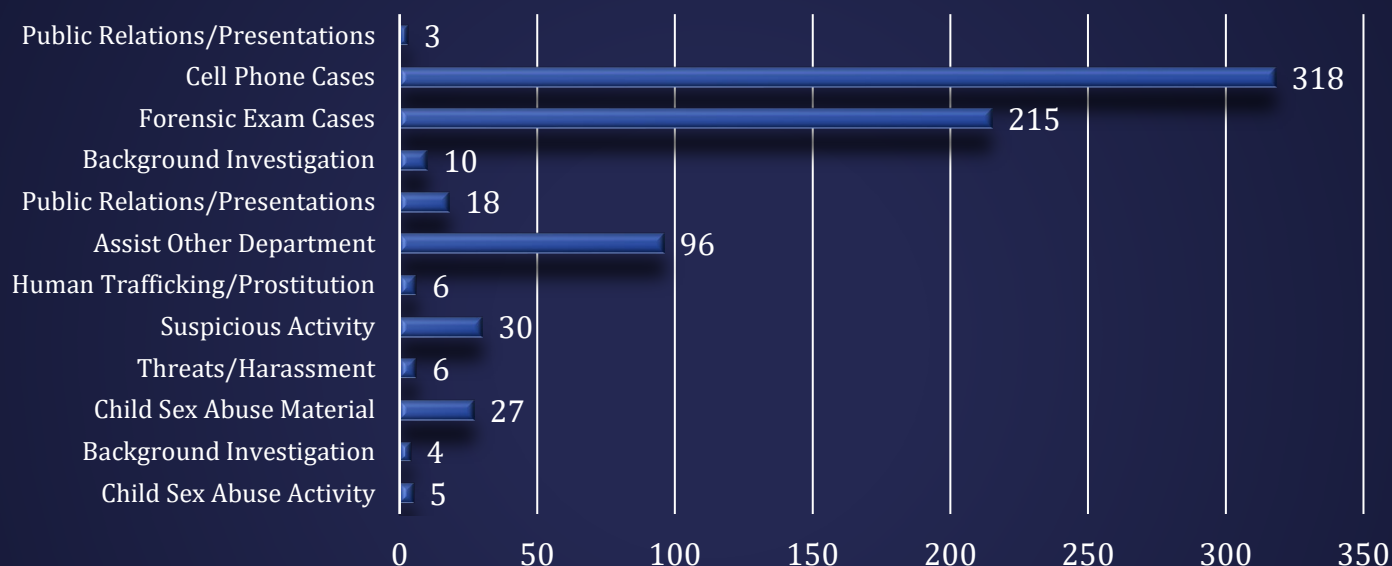


MACOMB AREA COMPUTER ENFORCEMENT (M.A.C.E.)

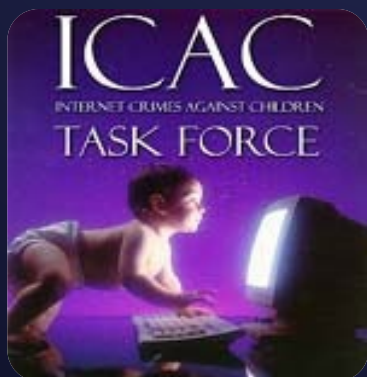


The M.A.C.E. unit had reduced staffing from the year prior where a Sergeant position and two Deputy / Detective positions were reallocated due to staffing shortages. For the year 2022, there were 2 Detectives assigned to the Macomb Area Computer Enforcement (M.A.C.E.) team. One detective concentrated on computer crime investigations and the other concentrate on the forensic review of electronic evidence. Both detectives work in coordination with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (N.C.M.E.C.) as well as the Michigan Internet Crimes Against Children (I.C.A.C.) task force to investigate crimes against children. The detectives also work together on computer based fraud complaints also known as “cybercrime”.

M.A.C.E. INVESTIGATIONS ACTIVITY



The M.A.C.E. forensic lab provides electronic evidence services for Macomb County Law Enforcement Agencies. In 2022, the M.A.C.E. forensic lab received upgraded hardware equipment at a cost of \$25,844.59. This upgrade enhances the forensic examiner’s abilities to handle electronic/digital evidence and to keep up with the ever changing advances of modern technology.

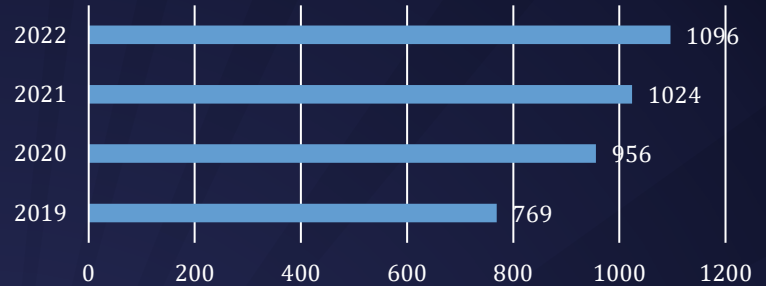


MACOMB AUTO THEFT SQUAD (M.A.T.S.)



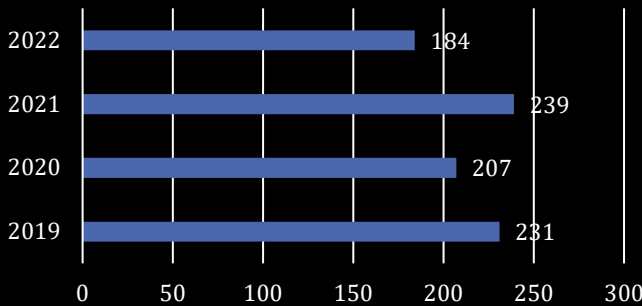
The Macomb Auto Theft Squad is a multi-jurisdictional task force comprised of investigators from the Macomb County Sheriff's Office, Center Line Department of Public Safety, Clinton Township Police Department, Roseville Police Department, Sterling Heights Police Department. The unit's manpower totals eleven Detectives and one full time Office Assistant Senior. In addition, the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office received funding to provide a full-time assistant prosecutor to the squad to prosecute all cases generated by M.A.T.S. and to initiate forfeiture proceedings as mandated by law. The Macomb Auto Theft Squad investigates auto theft and its related crimes including insurance fraud.

Cases Initiated by MATS 2022



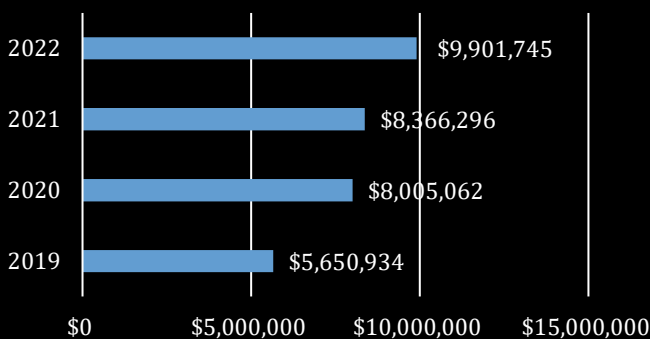
During the year 2022, the MATS unit initiated 72 more cases, and recovered 450 stolen vehicles worth \$9,901,745.00.

Total Arrests By MATS 2022

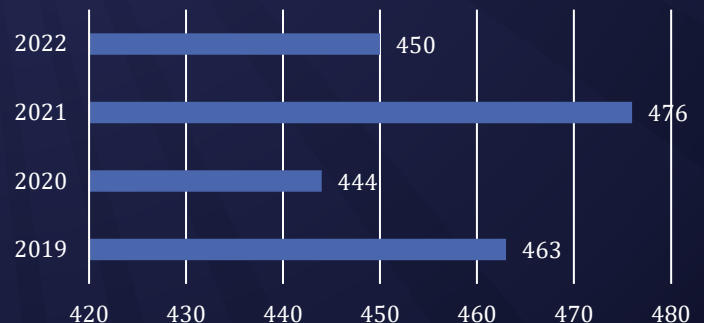


The MATS unit continues to investigate automobile related criminal activities throughout Macomb County. The unit will continue to track and document dates, times, and locations of crimes occurring in these areas to predict the most likely date, time and area of occurrence. Once these issues are identified, the unit will work specific details in an attempt to reduce this increasing amount of automobile related crimes. The MATS unit continues to work in conjunction with other auto theft units, police departments, and insurance companies in Southeastern Michigan to achieve the same common goal.

The Macomb Auto Theft Squad receives funding from the Michigan Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA). The ATPA is funded by an annual assessment on automobile insurance companies at \$1 per motor vehicle including passenger and commercial motor vehicles. Since the inception of the ATPA in 1986, auto thefts in Michigan has decreased by 62%. Nationally, thefts have decreased by almost 40% as well. ATPA's success in the battle against auto theft is the direct result of dedication and efforts of the men and women who are a part of law enforcement agencies, prosecutor offices, and community organizations.

SPECIAL WEAPONS AND TACTICS (S.W.A.T.)



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office SWAT team is a tactical team that operates through a cooperative effort with the Chesterfield Police Department, Eastpointe Police Department, Fraser Police Department, and New Baltimore Police Department. The Macomb County Sheriff's SWAT team assists departmental personnel and outside agencies during circumstances that involve potentially life-threatening situations. Responses include but are not limited to the following: Barricaded Subject(s), sniping incidents, search and arrest warrants-when considered high-risk (likelihood of armed or combative subjects), CBRNE terrorist events, hostage situations, workplace and school violence situations, executive protection.

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office S.W.A.T. team is comprised of the following **twenty-six (26)** S.W.A.T. operators and four **(4)** medical personnel.

- 17 from Macomb County Sheriff's Office
- 4 from Chesterfield Township Police
- 2 from Eastpointe Police Department
- 1 from New Baltimore Police Department
- 2 from Fraser Police Department
- 2 Doctors and 2 Medics



A typical annual training schedule for the Macomb County Sheriff S.W.A.T. team consists of two days of training per month, one week of specialized training per year, and one week of refresher training in Camp Grayling Michigan at the Northern Michigan Law Enforcement Training Group (NMLETG). This training schedule brings us in line with training standards set by the National Tactical Officers Association (NTOA).

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office SWAT team continues to excel and improve on their tactics. They strive to be the best, while maintaining professionalism and excellence within the law enforcement community. With the continued support of our administration and the dedication the SWAT Team Operators put forth, we will continue maintaining a high level of success.



FIRE INVESTIGATIONS UNIT



During 2022, a total of 18 fires were investigated resulting in 12 deemed undetermined, 3 determined accidental, 3 determined incendiary or arson. The team continued with ongoing training for all unit members to keep current on the changes in the fire investigation field with NFPA 921 and NFPA 1033.

The Fire Investigation Unit continues to provide a much-needed service to Macomb County residents as well as a valuable service to the local fire departments in our community. The primary goal of the unit is to keep the personnel trained and replace the retiring investigators with new talent.

CRASH INVESTIGATIONS UNIT (C.I.U.)



The MCSO Crash Investigation Unit was activated 23 times in 2022. Of the 23 activations, ten were MCSO fatalities, twelve were serious injury crashes. Six full crash reconstructions were completed and are currently pending authorization and/or court disposition. The Crash team initiated and completed 24 Event Data Recorder downloads.

The C.I.U. put a new crash ride vehicle into service, which is equipped with a roll out shelving unit that contains all of the equipment to process a crash investigation. The new shelving unit allows Deputies easier access to all the equipment. It also allows batteries to be charged for our cameras, scanners, lights and UAV drones.

We were able to train three new Crash Investigation Deputies in the event data recorder downloads. Each deputy completed the appropriate courses and manual downloads and are currently certified to image/download data from the event data recorders. There were also several Deputies that attended the MATAI conference in 2022 gaining valuable experience and knowledge.

Looking forward to 2023, the Crash Investigation unit will continue to train with the Unmanned Aerial Unit (UAV). Our goal is to work in concert utilizing aerial photographs along with Pix4D software. The combination of Pix4D and Scene software (FARO) will assist with documenting both crash and crime scene, merging all the collected data into a brilliant court room presentation. This combination of software will also assist the Crash team with single car crashes where less 3D scans will be required, ultimately opening the roadways sooner.

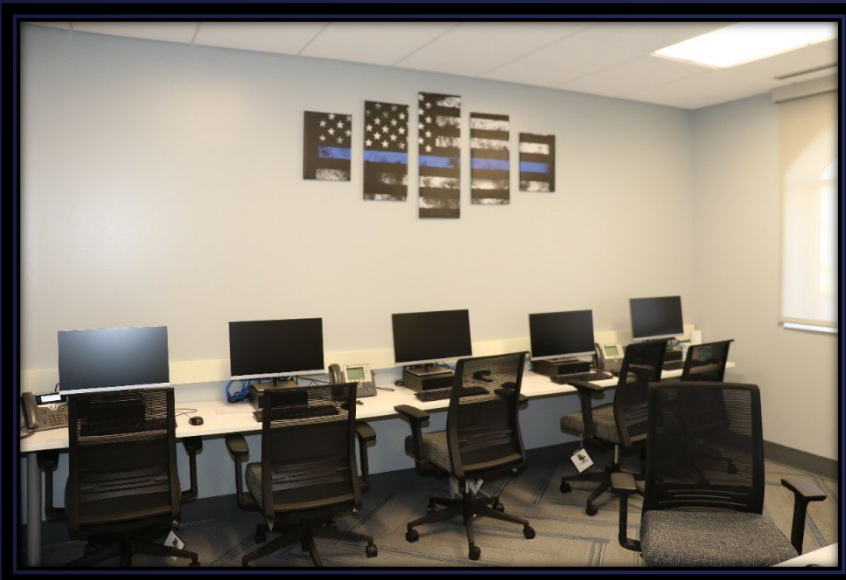
TRAINING DIVISION



The Administrative Lieutenant maintains oversight of the Sheriff's Office Training Bureau and the Firearms Unit. There are two sergeants assigned to training, one sergeant to firearms and one administrative coordinator that assists the lieutenant and sergeants. The Training Bureau facilitates all training for Macomb County Sheriff's Office, both in-service and advanced training at various locations.

The Administrative Lieutenant serves as the liaison between the Office of the Sheriff and the Civil Service Commission and assists the Commission in applying promotional testing procedures as required by collective bargaining agreements and Civil Service rules.

The Commission met 22 times in 2022, facilitating the hiring of 33 new Correctional Deputies, 24 Dispatchers and 16 Deputy Sheriff's at the Sheriff's Office in 2022. 83 applications for Correctional Deputy were received, 206 applications for Dispatchers were processed and 37 applications for Deputy Sheriff.



There were 12 training days conducted covering all three shifts in 2022.

There was over 22,771 hours of mandatory Corrections training completed for Command, Deputies and Corrections Deputies to maintain compliance with the MSCTC requirements.

Total agency training of all personnel was 42,336 hours.

All MCOLES and MSCTC requirements were met by all deputies in 2022.

The Sheriff's Office is on the following committees:

- Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) / Local Planning Team (LPT)
- Macomb County Office of Emergency Management/First Responders
- Suicide Prevention Coalition
- Macomb County Civil Service
- The Macomb County Office of Emergency Management V.I.P.S. program

The Sheriff's Office participates in the UASI and this is the mechanism through which the Sheriff's Office receives Operation Stonegarden Grant awards. The E.M./First Responder Committee is a sub-committee of the LPT and meets separately. The Macomb County Suicide Prevention Coalition continues to meet quarterly.



FIREARMS TRAINING DIVISION



The Firearms Unit has had another robust year. In addition to the ongoing instruction of staff and reserves, our Sergeant in charge worked diligently on Use of Force reviews.

Some of the highlights for the unit this year were:

- Firearms qualifications for patrol consisted of pistol, rifle, and shotgun use in addition to threat assessment (shoot/don't shoot) and malfunction drills.

- All Corrections Deputies completed eight (8) hours of hands-on, practical Use of Force Training.
- 2022 Reserve Academy completed with St. Clair County Sheriff's Office sending members.
- The new pistol project was approved, and new pistols were purchased. This brings the Macomb County Sheriff's Office to the forefront of technology for all sworn staff.
- Implementation of CEWs in the Jail for C.E.R.T. This tool has shown that it is a safe and reliable alternative in force. The numbers have shown that it is very effective as a deterrent and never having to be deployed. CEWs were used at a deterrent 60 times. Probe and drive stuns were only used 15 times.
- CEWs were used 34 times on the road, 27 times as a deterrent only.
- 429 Use of Force reviews were conducted for 2022 for both the road and jail.



LIQUOR ENFORCEMENT



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office, under the authority of PA 58 of 1998, enforces the provisions of the statute of the Michigan Liquor Control Code. The responsibilities granted to the sheriff include:

- 1) Inspections of licensed establishments.
- 2) Conducting criminal background checks on all new and transfer liquor license applications.
- 3) Ensuring that the building housing the licensed establishment meets local code.
- 4) Granting special one-day liquor licenses.
- 5) Conducting investigation at licensed establishments targeting the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors.

As part of the duties for the Deputies assigned to contracted areas, they conduct inspections of licensed liquor establishments. These inspections verify that the licensees are operating within the guidelines established by the Liquor Control Commission. The inspection forms are then reviewed and retained by the Administrative Lieutenant.

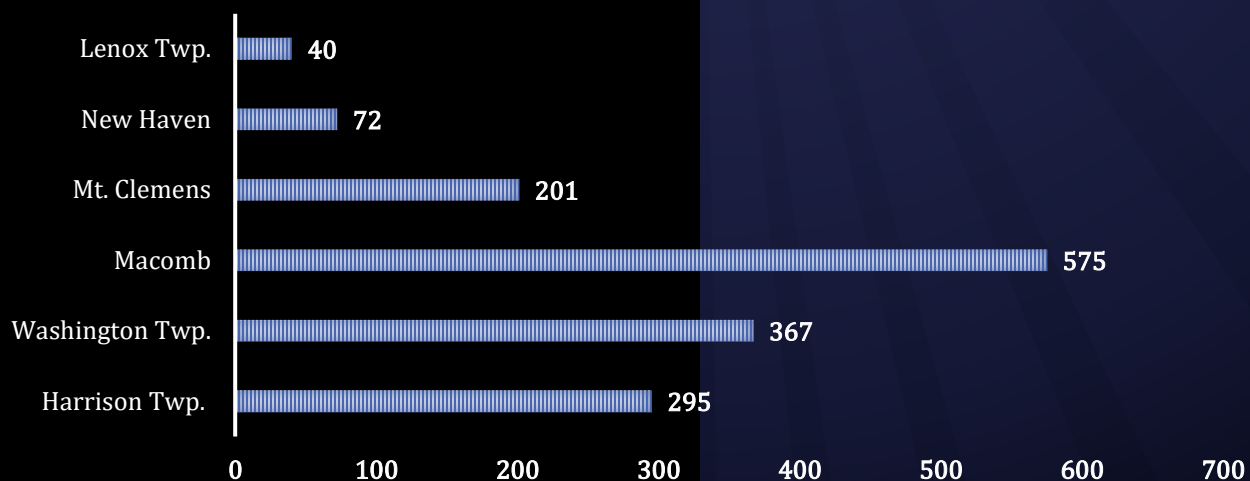
Deputies from the Sheriff's Office monitor and inspect liquor establishments continuously throughout the year.



In 2022, the Sheriff's Office conducted 1,550 inspections.

Intermittently, throughout the year, the Sheriff's Office receives requests (by the Liquor Control Commission) to investigate complaints that are filed directly with the L.C.C. Many of these complaints involve a suspension or the placing "in escrow" of a liquor license due to lack or proper documentation (insurance certificates), or the temporary suspension due to the seasonal nature of the business by the licensee. These complaints are received, investigated and processed through the office of the Administrative Lieutenant. There were two investigations conducted in 2022 which resulted in violations being issued.

LIQUOR INSPECTIONS



CIVIL DIVISION



The Civil Division falls under the direction of the Macomb County Sheriff's Office. The Civil Division which is contracted through the county to a private business, Civil Staffing Resources LLC, is responsible for the serving of legal papers, such as subpoenas or Personal Protection Orders of the Court and the home foreclosure auction, as prescribed by State Law.

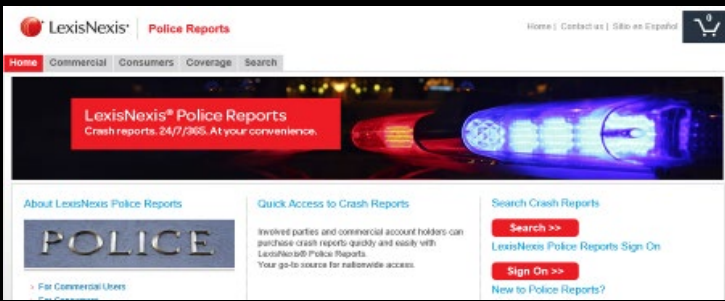

The Uniform Services Division includes a Traffic Bureau, Court Security, Prisoner Transport, Canine (K-9) Unit, Marine Division, Dive Team, Reserve Deputies, and Fleet Management. In addition to these units, *Uniform Services* are responsible for handling all special events that require additional staffing.

Six communities' contract with the Macomb County Sheriff's Office for 24/7 police services. Emergency response is provided in four townships that do not have police departments. They are Armada, Bruce, Ray and Richmond Townships. The Sheriff's Office also responds to any nearby local, state or federal agency which requests assistance.

Lenox Township adds Motor Carrier Enforcement:



In January of 2022, Lenox Township added a Motor Carrier Enforcement position to monitor commercial vehicle traffic throughout the Township. The Sworn Deputy position also does traffic enforcement, special events in the Township, and backs up other Deputies in Lenox Township.

Washington Township adds Traffic and Motor Carrier Enforcement:



In April of 2022, Washington Township added a Traffic Enforcement position and a Motor Carrier Enforcement position. The Motor Carrier primarily focuses on commercial vehicle enforcement, while the Traffic Enforcement position primarily focuses on general traffic enforcement. Both spots are also available to handle special events in the Township along with backing up their partners assigned to patrol the Township and responding to any emergency in the Township.

TRAFFIC BUREAU



The 2022 Macomb County Sheriff's Office Traffic Bureau consisted of 1 Sergeant, 3 Deputies (funded through the Secondary Road Patrol Grant 416 Grant) and a County funded Motor Carrier Deputy.

Traffic Bureau personnel are responsible for responding to accidents, patrolling Secondary Roads, traffic enforcement, special events and education to the public on installing Child Safety Seats. The Motor Carrier Deputy was responsible for enforcing Motor Carrier Laws and complaints for the entire County and Abandoned Vehicles in our Patrol Areas.

The Macomb County Traffic Bureau was responsible for traffic details for Tons of Trucks (Macomb Twp), Run the Plank (Macomb Twp) car cruises in multiple cities, the Santa Parade (Mt. Clemens), Selfridge Air Show, and numerous other special events throughout the County.

Macomb County Sheriff's Office received \$242,941.00 in grant money to conduct Seat Belt enforcement, Drunk/Drugged Driving Enforcement, and Intersection Enforcement for Bicycles and Pedestrians. The grant money was split between the Macomb County Sheriff's Office, Warren PD, Chesterfield Twp PD, Clinton Twp PD, Shelby Twp PD, St. Clair Shores PD, Roseville PD and Sterling Heights PD. The Traffic Bureau Sergeant was the Project Manager for the Grant and was responsible for dispersing the grant money, check log sheets and overtime hours from each department and submitting overtime for reimbursement.

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office also approximately \$43,745.00 in grant money for the Pedestrian/Bicycle grant for the City of Warren. The grant focused on intersections and the enforcement of Bicycle and Pedestrian walkways. \$35,000.00 was funded through OHSP and Macomb County contributed \$8,745.00 (20% match) in the form of operating costs.

The County funded Motor Carrier Deputy was responsible for conducting motor carrier complaints, motor carrier inspections and answering complaints received by the Macomb County Road Commission. This deputy is also assigned to process the abandoned vehicles handled by our department. Once the ABAN Vehicles are processed, they are sold off at various auctions around the County.

CANINE UNIT (K9)

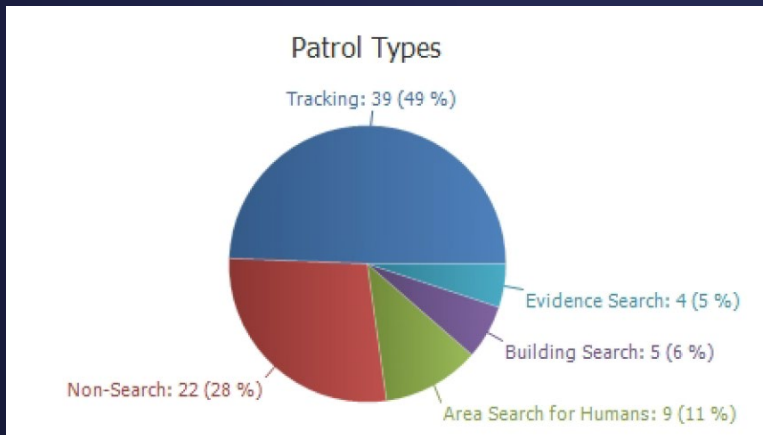


During this year our K9 teams were utilized by our department as well as other agencies through the tri-county area. Our K9 teams were deployed 117 times in 2022. Both K9 teams certified with National Association of Professional Canine Handlers. (NAPCH). Our Narcotic dogs are currently the only and first K9's to be trained in the odor of Soboxone.

K9 Enzo: Trained in Narcotic detection, tracking, article search, building search, handler protection and suspect apprehension.

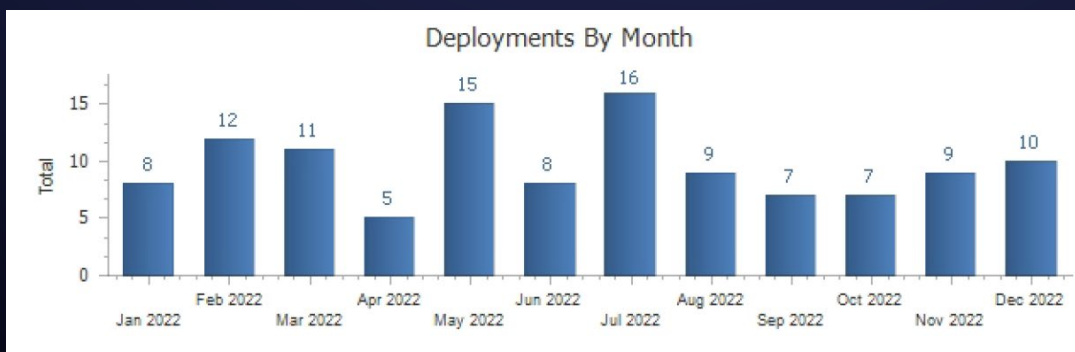
K9 Radar: Trained in Narcotic detection, tracking, article search, building search, handler protection and suspect apprehension.

K9 training consists of weekly training with various departments including police tracking, apprehension, article searches, along with detection with explosives and narcotics. Additionally, we train our K9's while at home and while on patrol to keep them to national standards for police departments. The handlers also look for any additional classes or instruction courses that may become available. We continue to use Packtrack which is a program that keeps detailed records of K9 use, such as training, demos and deployments and patrol work. All K9 teams certify annually in the above specialties through NAPCH which recognized and utilized in Southeast Michigan.

COURT SECURITY



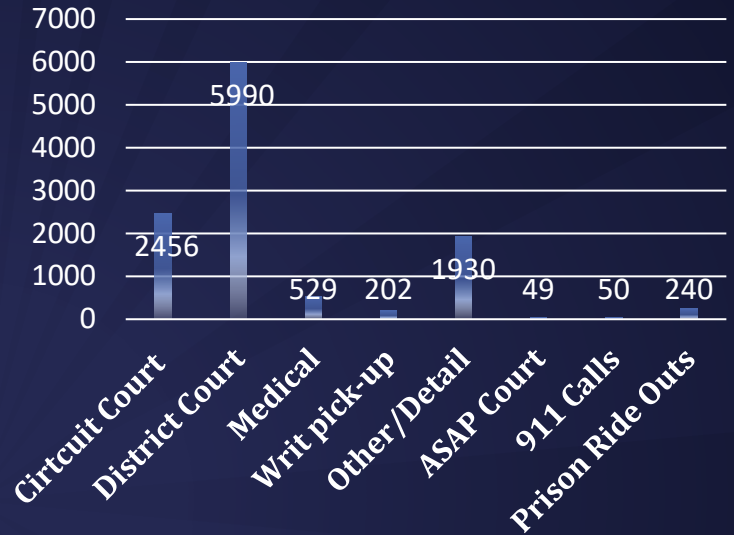
The Macomb County Sheriff's Office Inmate Transport and Court Security Division is responsible to provide safety and security to the judges, courthouse staff, lawyers, inmates and public. This also includes security for the offices of the County Commissioners, Prosecutors, and Treasurer's Office, Friend of the Court, Probate Court, Old County Building, Reimbursement, Probation Department and other ancillary offices of Macomb County within the locations listed above. It is the duty of the Protective Service Officers to screen the public of any items that could be considered weapons when entering the county buildings.

This year there were 39 incidents that required Deputy Intervention. These incidents included disorderly persons, assault, mental health interventions, threats towards judicial staff and general information. No individuals were harmed during these issues.

There were no bomb threats or successful prisoner escapes at the Macomb County Circuit Court, District Courts or prisoner transport destinations for the year 2022.

Due to lifted COVID restrictions in 2022, transport statistics were up over 16% from 2021. The Prisoner Transportation Division and Circuit Court Station Three Lock-up Deputies traveled a total of 172,029 miles in the year 2022. Considering the large number of miles traveled, no major accidents occurred, and no deputies, inmates or members of the public were injured in the course of those transports.

INMATE TRANSPORT



HONOR GUARD



In 2022, the Macomb County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard was involved in 23 details. These details included the presentation of the National Colors, casket watch for active-duty and retiree funerals, funeral assistance for active-duty death and memorial details during police week in Washington DC.

2022 also brought a return of our pasta dinner at Penna's of Sterling Heights. In 2022, the unit had one member resign but added two additional members. We currently have 20 members assigned to the unit.

An important part of our Honor Guard is to maintain a professional relationship with area Honor Guards. Our unit assisted the Shelby Township Police Department with an active-duty death. On November 5, 2022, Sgt. Kammerzell suffered a medical emergency while on duty. He was transported to the hospital where he died. Immediately, our unit was in contact with the Shelby Township Honor Guard offering assistance and support. Our unit was requested to be the standing color guard for the funeral services. On June 16, 2022, the Honor Guard presented the National Colors at Comerica Park for the Detroit Tigers game.



MOTOR UNIT



Motors were deployed to multiple special events, such as: assisting the Secret Service and Michigan State Police for former President Donald Trump with a Motorcade on two occasions, the Selfridge Air National Guard Air Show, Gratiot Cruise, Mt. Clemens Fireworks, Memorial and Motorcycle Dedication Ride for Sergeant Daryl Brown, and assist in Silver Bells down in Lansing.

The Motorcycle Unit is designed to provide additional tools to aid in patrol, traffic enforcement, and to further protect and serve the citizens of Macomb County. Additionally, Motors are utilized in various special events where speed, agility, and precision are required and have assisted with Presidential motorcades across the State of Michigan as well as local events and road closures.

The MCSO Motor Unit currently consists of a Sergeant and seven certified Deputies over all three departmental shifts. All members passed a rigorous training program in order to be eligible to operate a motorcycle, conduct traffic stops, and complete tasks in a safe manner. 2022 saw a notable uptick in Motor Unit details conducted both locally and statewide.

The Motor Unit currently utilizes six 2012 Harley Electra Glide motorcycles. This year the unit was outfitted with new Shoei Neotec 2 modular helmets in July of 2022 which vastly improved safety and communication for all riders. The uniforms acquired during 2021 continue to be of high quality and have had the chance to be tested in various conditions, including use below freezing temperatures.

Overall, the Motor Unit compiled approximately 13,000 miles and 1,400 hours of Motor use. Deputies utilized the motors on a regular basis on both day and afternoon shift. The Motor Unit incurred no injuries nor damage to any equipment this year.



UNMANNED AERIAL VEHICLE / DRONE (U.A.V.)



The UAV (Unmanned Aerial Vehicle or Drone) Unit is comprised of thirteen sworn Deputies and two sworn Sergeants totaling fifteen members. All team members possess a current FAA Part 107 Airman's Certificate with a small Unmanned Aircraft System (sUAS) rating that must be renewed every two years. The UAV Unit provides aerial and tactical support for numerous operations within the Sheriff's Office patrol area and surrounding agencies within the county. The primary function of the UAV Unit is search and rescue, but our drones are also utilized for documenting crime scenes, crash scenes, Mobile Field Force support, Marine Division support, K-9 support, Negotiator support, SWAT operations, and public relation demonstrations. The UAV Unit trains on a monthly basis at various indoor and outdoor locations throughout our patrol area.

The drones were also deployed by Evidence Technician Deputy 16 times for crash reconstruction and crime scene documentation. Of the 57 deployments this year, there were zero incidents involving pilot error, equipment failure, or any damage to our equipment.

The drones were deployed 30 times this year. Most of the deployments were a search and rescue type situation with the remainder involving the search for a suspect that fled on foot from an incident. Also, several of this year's deployments included assisting neighboring agencies when they requested drone support.

The drones were also deployed by Evidence Technician Bosek 19 times for crash reconstruction and crime scene documentation.



CRISIS NEGOTIATION TEAM (C.N.T.)



In 2022, the Crisis Negotiation Team increased personnel and foothold in Macomb County as a true regional team. Two members were added from the City of Eastpointe Police Department. Questionnaires were sent to the Eastpointe PD for candidates to fill out for selection to the team.

The C.N.T. was able to attend the Midwest Hostage Negotiators Conference in Columbus Ohio in September 2022. Presenters from across the United States and Canada provided full case study and scenario debrief to better equip our team with recent crisis situations. The presentations included their positive actions along with the mistakes they made for us to learn from.

The two new members were able to attend the FBI Basic Hostage Negotiator's 40-hour course. The FBI 40-hour course provides the standard operation procedures for the team. This also provides the up-to-date information for current trends in negotiations.

The C.N.T. continues to train monthly, correlating with one of the S.W.A.T. training days. Live and scenario-based training is scheduled to improve negotiators skill sets. We also trained with the Shelby Twp. PD Negotiators to learn from each other's techniques and to continue our excellent working relationship. The team continues to use the "836 Technologies" brand CINT (Critical Incident Negotiations Team) Thrown Phone/Command Center equipment. The Mobile Command Center has been upgraded with a more advanced telescoping camera which can record up to 240 hours of continuous activity.



The Macomb County Crisis Negotiation Team will look to expand our regional team approach in 2023 by soliciting two more officers from outside police agencies that already participate with our regional Macomb County SWAT team. The benefits have proven to be notable in response time, availability of personnel, and cost-efficient responses.



MOBILE FIELD FORCE (M.F.F.)



The Mobile Field Force unit is designed to provide rapid, organized response to civil disorder, crowd control, or other tactical situations in Macomb County and our surrounding communities as requested. The Macomb County Sheriff's detachment is a company sized multi-jurisdictional team supplemented by Clinton Township, Roseville, Sterling Heights, Warren, Saint Clair Shores, Shelby Township, Eastpointe, Richmond and Port Huron in a multi task force unit. MFF has 120 members in total.

The Mobile Field Force concept is based on the military company system staffed with eighty sworn law enforcement officers. Funding for equipment and training is off set through grants secured by Macomb County's Office of Emergency Management. This year the acquisition of a Torsion Axle travel trailer and Stream light Stinger flashlights for all members were dedicated to the unit.



The Sheriff's component of MFF consists of 32 sworn law enforcement officers committed to this composite county team. Medstar ambulance supports the Mobile Field Force concept with four tactical paramedics. These medics can be used to treat injured persons without delaying necessary lifesaving treatment in the field.



While MFF continues to improve and evolve with training and experience, 2023 holds expectations of another successful year of serving the people of Macomb County.



MARINE DIVISION



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office is responsible for patrolling 85 square miles of Lake Saint Clair and connecting rivers. The Sheriff's Office maintains a fleet of vessels that afford the Marine Division to respond to any water-related emergency throughout the county or neighboring jurisdictions. The Marine Division personnel are trained and equipped for open water rescue, maritime law enforcement, homeland security interdiction efforts, and vessel fire suppression.

The Marine Division is staffed with four full time Sheriff's Deputies to include one Lieutenant, one Sergeant, and two Deputies. During the summer patrol season two additional Deputies were assigned to the Marine Division to be deployed as additional afternoon shift enforcement. The Macomb County Sheriff's Office Marine Division continues to be the most visible public safety agency on Lake St. Clair. The Macomb County Marine Division logs more patrol hours than any other agency on Lake St. Clair and is one of the most active law enforcement marine divisions in the state.

The Marine Division designated reserve component consists of seventy members who volunteer their time and efforts to ensure the safety of the Lake St. Clair boating community. Members of the reserve unit attend both the Macomb County Sheriff Office reserve academy and the Marine Division academy to act in the capacity of a Marine Safety Officer. Marine Safety Officers are deputized by the Sheriff to enforce Michigan Marine law. These Marine Division reservists are a true force multiplier who provide additional resources for water patrol related activities and public education related events.

In 2022, the Marine Safety Officers (MSO) unit voluntarily dedicated 6,862 hours to the Marine Division's primary mission of marine safety. Based on current wages for a deputy sheriff the MSO's voluntarily dedicated hours that would equate to \$236,739 in enlisted wage costs.

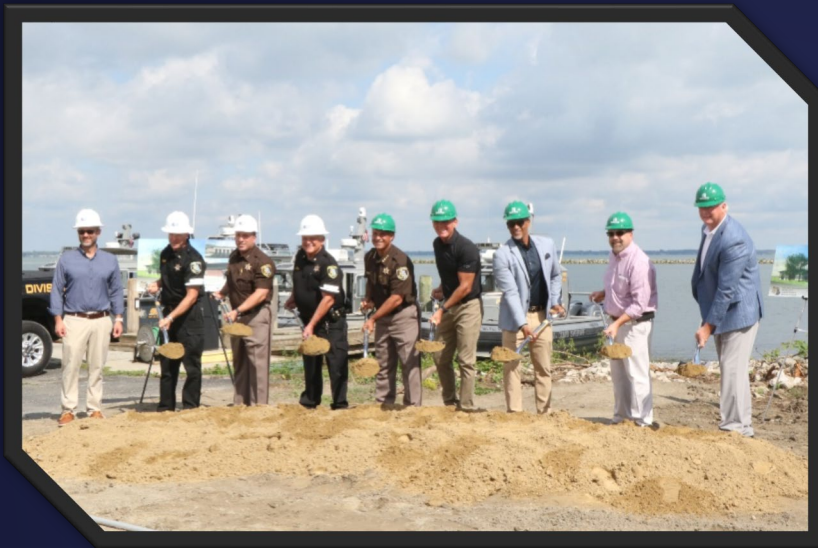


MARINE DIVISION



An expanded and renovated marine station is a primary long-term goal. The current location on South River Rd is over 40 years old with the last significant renovation improvement project completed in 1985.

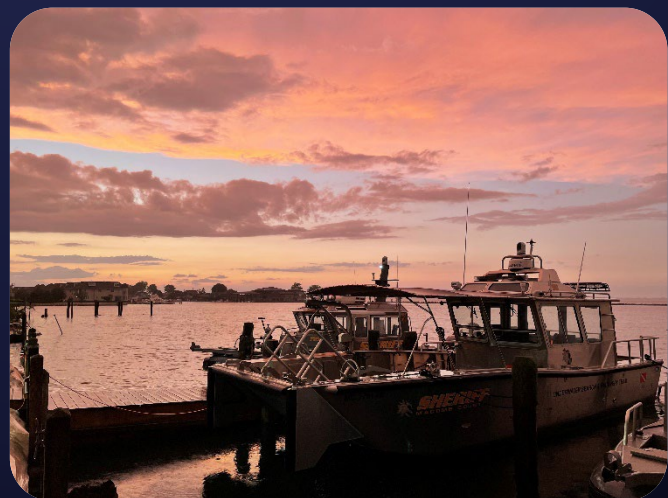
In 2021 the County announced an 8.5-million-dollar renovation to the Marine Division. The construction project was awarded to Anderson, Eckstein & Westrick, Inc. located in Shelby Township, MI. The demolition of the old boathouse began in September 2022. Construction of the new, state of the art Marine Station will begin in January of 2023. The project is expected to be completed in the summer of 2023.



BOATER'S SAFETY INSTRUCTION

The Marine Division teaches the state approved boater's safety course "Boat Michigan-A Course on Responsible Boating." During the winter months, our Deputies are primarily in the seventh grade with a focus on teaching boaters' safety at both public and private schools. The Marine Division teaches more than 5,000 students on an annual basis. The Marine Division reservists teach the same classes in the evenings to the general public free of charge.

In addition, the Marine Division continues to be a leader within the State of Michigan in the administration of water safety public education related activities. Throughout the year, Marine Division Deputies teach many water safety courses providing citizens the opportunity to obtain their Michigan Boating Safety Certificate. These classes are taught monthly free of charge. Citizens can visit the Macomb County Sheriff's Facebook page to sign up for a class.



DIVE TEAM



The Macomb County Sheriff's Under Water Search and Recovery Team (USRT) is comprised of 13 full time Sheriff's Deputies. These deputies are certified divers through The Professional Association of Dive Instructors (PADI), the largest certifying agency of divers in the world.

During 2022, the team completed 12 monthly scheduled training days. During training, USRT utilized several different locations in an attempt to vary dive conditions. These dives included shore entry, sea wall entry and boat entry. Grid and pendulum searches were conducted with tethered divers while free diving targets was also practiced. Training dives were commonly accompanied by UROV operations and Side Scan Sonar.

During 2023, MCSO USRT will be researching funds available through UASI (Urban Areas Security Initiative) for training funding and possible equipment acquisitions. This program assists high threat, high density urban areas in efforts to respond to, and recover from acts of terrorism.



MCSO USRT conducted a joint training exercise in St. Ignace with the Region Eight Dive Group from 10/24/22 to 10/26/22. The Region Two Dive Teams that participated were Macomb County, Downriver Mutual Aid, Genesee County, Lapeer County, Oakland County, Wayne County, Sanilac County, and St. Clair County.

DISPATCH CENTER



The Dispatch Center operates out of the COMTEC building located in Mount Clemens, Michigan. In 2022, Macomb County Dispatch has 1 Director, 1 Operations Manager, 1 Dispatch Training Supervisor, 6 Dispatch Shift Supervisors and 54 full time Dispatchers. The Sheriff's Office is budgeted for 59 Dispatchers and is currently working on filling additional vacancies.

DISPATCH CENTER



As defined in Public Act 32, Dispatchers in the state are required to complete initial training courses to fulfill Module I and Module II as well as continue education to remain compliant. Module I consist of a 40-hour basic telecommunicator training course approved by the State 911 Committee (SNC) and must be completed within 18 months of hire. Within 24 months of hire, Dispatchers must complete Module II, a 40-hour advanced training course approved by the SNC. Once training requirements are completed a telecommunicator is considered designated. Designated Dispatchers are required to complete 24 hours of training every 24 months. If a designated Dispatcher fails to complete training required, the SNC will issue a noncompliance notification to the agency which can potentially result in loss of training funds. MCSO Dispatchers are fully compliant with state required training standards and policies. In addition to state required training all MCSO staff must remain agency compliant on EMD certifications as well as CPR/AED and Basic First AID.

All staff also completes monthly, web-based training, provided by Police Legal Sciences. PLS awards Dispatchers 1 credit per completed monthly lesson, totaling 12 credits per year. PLS training keeps all staff compliant by meeting the requirement of 24 credits every 2 years. Any additional outside training is counted toward continuing education credit as well. Over 40 internal training courses were taught in our training center in 2022. A total of 2,416 hours were completed in 2022.

In the past year, we had the pleasure of hosting Adam Timm from the Healthy Dispatcher for two full-day courses focused on diffusing conflicts and building resilience. Adam is a nationally known trainer and an incredible motivational speaker. We were thrilled to welcome dispatchers from all over the State to participate in these classes. The courses provided valuable insight and practical techniques for dealing with challenging situations, both in the workplace and in everyday life. We received overwhelmingly positive feedback from attendees, who found the sessions to be engaging, informative, and impactful. Overall, our partnership with Adam and the Healthy Dispatcher has been a tremendous success, and we look forward to future collaborations.

DISPATCH CENTER



In April of 2022, we achieved a significant milestone in our efforts to improve E-911 operations in Macomb County. We are proud to report that after several years of hard work and collaboration with public safety partners, such as our Police and Fire Departments, we were successful in securing a local funding mechanism for E-911 operations. The local surcharge of \$0.42/device per month was imposed by a favorable vote of the County Board of Commissioners. This achievement marks a major step forward in our efforts to make sure funding is available for necessary resources, enhancements, and upgrades. We are especially proud to have secured this local fee as Macomb County was the last in the county to assess it. The achievement is a testament to the dedication and hard work of our team and public safety partners, and we look forward to continuing to work together to enhance 911 in Macomb!



Medstar and Sheriff's Dispatch have entered into an agreement to share CAD data and streamline our process of communication between both centers. This project will not be complete until estimated Fall of 2023, but much of the planning took place in 2022. The integration will eliminate approximately 27,000 phone calls a year between our centers and allow us to share real time CAD comments and unit status updates on all calls for service.



Armada Township Fire

In 2022, Armada Township Fire Department joined the county for full time Dispatch services. ARFD is now fully integrated with Dispatch with the exception of Station Alerting which is scheduled to be completed Spring of 2023.

Next Generation 911 Upgrade

We recently completed successful demos with four network vendors for a fiber optics-based telecommunications network, as well as four call handling equipment vendors. This project will involve migrating off of the copper analog legacy network and onto the EsiNET (emergency services internet network), a process that will take approximately 18 months to complete. This is a cohesive project involving all 9 Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPS) in our County, and we are confident that it will provide us with many benefits. By transitioning to this new network, we'll be able to achieve greater redundancy for call delivery, interoperability, and enhanced technology opportunities. We believe this will enable us to provide even better response to our community and provide additional resources to dispatchers to assist in call taking and life saving efforts. Both the network vendor and phone vendor selection will go in front of the Board of Commissioners for approval in summer 2023.



CORRECTIONS SERVICES



JAIL ADMINISTRATION



The Macomb County Jail located at Groesbeck and Elizabeth in Mt. Clemens, Michigan is one of the largest correctional facilities in the State of Michigan. The care and custody and maintenance of the 376,551 square foot facility falls under the responsibility of the Jail Administration and Jail Operations team under the direction of Jail Administrator Captain.

In 2022, the COVID-19 pandemic continued to affect operations and administration daily. Jail administration worked with Wellpath staff to continue the highest level of attention to safe operations for staff and inmates.



Each day JA/JO reviews each jail report written, for a total of 3,442 case reports in 2022. There were 166 budgeted Corrections Deputy positions for 2022. In 2022 JA/JO worked with the corrections union to effectively and efficiently staff housing units and positions.



For the past 30 years, our Jail has earned and maintained the National Commission on Correctional Health Care accreditation. In April 2020, the JA/JO team worked with Wellpath to meet the standards and accomplish the accreditation process. The Accreditation is valid for three years and we anticipate the next inspection to be in 2023.

The annual MDOC inspection was performed on October 20, 2022. Macomb County Jail was found to be compliant with all areas of inspection including our Health and Physical standard R 791.732



JAIL OPERATIONS

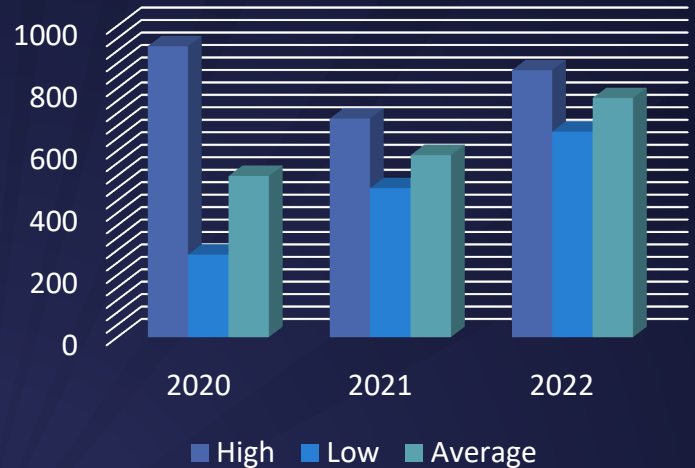


Maximum Security, and Annex areas remained offline in 2022. However, alterations were made to the D-Block area to allow temporary housing for construction projects. The rated design capacity in 2022 was 1082 inmates, both male and female. The average daily population went from 586 in 2021 to 769 (male 650, female 119) in 2022. The average daily population realized an increase of 31 % from 2021.

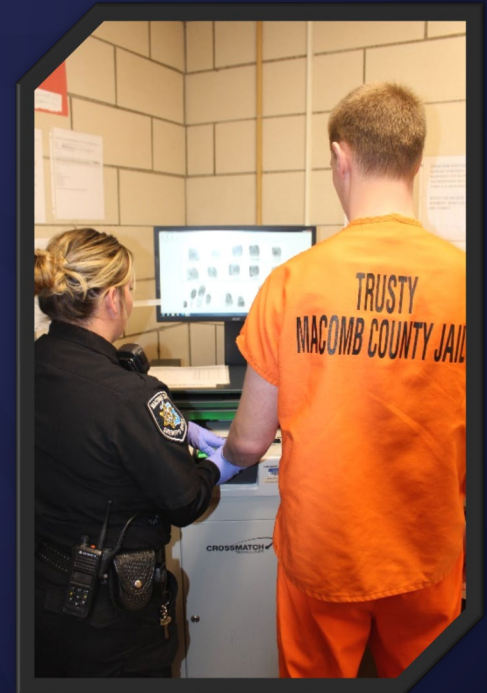
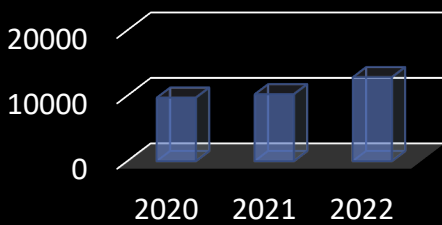
The team works daily with F&O to provide a clean, well-functioning facility as well as compile and maintain the Weekly Sanitation report as required. The jail team is responsible to give information to the Facility and Operations for jobs to be completed.

Through the RFP process Global Jail Tracker was chosen to be the new jail management system at the Macomb County Jail. The Offendertrak JMS that was used by MCJ for the better part of 20 years was no longer supported by Motorola and needed to be replaced. Global Jail Tracker JMS was awarded the contract in December 2021 and was implemented in October 2022.

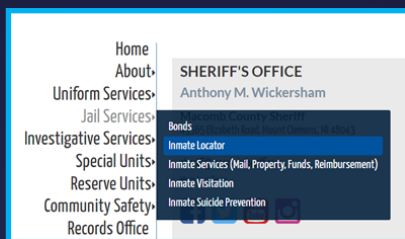

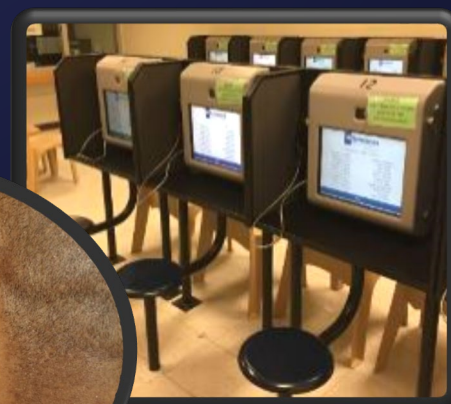
VIDEO VISITATION & TABLETS

ICSolutions (Inmate Calling Solutions) is the current provider for inmate phones and visitation. Due to Covid considerations, off-site video visitation continued in 2022 at the Macomb County Jail. We continued to offer one free of charge video visitation per week to each inmate.

In 2022 tablets continued to be issued to inmates to offer a platform for entertainment as well as electronic kites, grievances, and messaging. Inmates can stream movies, music, play games, read books, message family and friends for \$ 0.05 a minute. The kites and grievances application went live September 15th

CLASSIFICATION BUREAU



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office utilizes an objective classification plan to provide fair and consistent guidelines in determining prisoner assignments to housing areas, security level, treatment and program services. Original classifications and periodic reviews are performed to accommodate changes in charges, behavior, and to better align the jail population.



JAIL REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

In 1985, the Jail Reimbursement Program was implemented at the Macomb County Jail. The purpose of the program is to seek reimbursement from inmates to help defray the cost of housing. Technological advancements are continually being evaluated in an effort to improve this process and increase the amount of funds recovered. This money is generated by billing sentenced individuals \$45/day of incarceration at the Jail. This was a decrease of 8.49% from 2021.

INMATE HEALTH SERVICES



In 2022, Wellpath was under contract for medical, dental, and mental health services. Wellpath underwent some changes in personnel as it relates to the Jail. A new and improved Contract for medical services went out for bid in 2022 and Wellpath was selected to continue as our provider until December 2025. The new contract included increased services such as mental health group therapy, increased and improved communication regarding off site patient care and status, increase staffing and an improved medical kite and grievance response policy. A new dental suite was installed in the Jail for better comfort and care of the inmates.

Continental Canteen for food and commissary is our inmate food services. During the year and because of COVID-19 protocols, there were several changes that occurred. There were times that the kitchen was in operation with emergency Canteen staffing and limited trustees. Kitchen trustee help was limited, and meals were served in styrofoam containers to minimize contact. Continental Canteen also provides commissary services for inmates at the Jail. In 2022, inmates continued to order commissary by using the tablets or Visvox system.

CORRECTIONAL EDUCATION



L'Anse Creuse Public School District continues to provide correctional education for inmates at MCJ. The Jail team continues to work with L'Anse Creuse to schedule and facilitate these classes. Due to COVID-19, services were halted in 2020 and continued to be suspended throughout the majority of 2021. We resumed in-person learning in 2022.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM

Clinton Counseling Center Jail Substance Abuse Program is the contracted vendor that provides substance abuse treatment for incarcerated individuals. They are a licensed program designed to assist individuals housed in the Macomb County Jail with overcoming physical and psychological dependence to drugs and alcohol. Treatment services include Fast Track, Reentry Track, and VSAT (Veteran's Substance Abuse and Trauma). Prevention services in the jail include HIV Education, Drug Education and Community Resources, and Opioid/Narcan Education. The Jail Substance Abuse Program also provides community-based Overdose Education and Narcan Distribution programs, such as Narcan Basics, Narcan and Addiction Education, NOPE (Narcan Overdose Prevention Education), and NOPE for Community Mental Health.

STEPPING UP



Wayne State University Center for Behavioral Health and Justice has partnered with Macomb County in the Stepping Up Initiative. Due to COVID-19 this program was suspended in the year 2020.

In 2022, we re-established our partnership and worked with Wayne State University Center for Behavioral Health and Justice to look at our overall process of inmate intake and special services connection. The service connection for inmates requiring / requesting mental health, substance abuse or medical services was found to be excellent. We will continue to monitor and adjust to the needs of our inmate population as we have always strived to do.



MENTAL HEALTH DIVERSION

The Mental Health diversion program is facilitated by Macomb County Community Mental Health and is now overseen by Community Corrections. Jail Administration and Operations work with Community Mental Health to identify and divert low level offenders with mental health issues. CMH has been key in working with the Jail staff, mental health, probate, and criminal courts to provide appropriate placement for the inmates with severe mental health issues. In 2022, a therapist was provided to facilitate group therapy in the mental health housing units. This weekly group therapy session in mental health has been well received by the inmates and we anticipate continued participation into the new year.

CORRECTIONS EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (C.E.R.T.)



The Corrections Emergency Response Team is trained to deal with unruly uncooperative inmates and riotous situations within the confines of the jail. There were 106 deployments in 2022 vs. 111 deployments in 2021, a 4.5% decrease. C.E.R.T. has been utilized with inmates who are assaultive and require a restraint chair for safety of the inmate and staff. Handheld video and body worn camera videos are reviewed for each deployment.

The team has been trained in the use of taser and pepper ball. Currently, there are 54 Corrections Deputies that make up the Corrections Emergency Response Team.

CRISIS INCIDENT STRESS MANAGEMENT (C.I.S.M.)



The Macomb County Sheriff Crisis Incident Stress Management (C.I.S.M.) team was formed in the Spring of 2021. The C.I.S.M. team provides an avenue for peer support and crisis management to the employees of the Sheriff's Office.

The Macomb County Sheriff C.I.S.M. team is made up of 24 members of the Macomb County Sheriff's Office. All members have completed approximately 35 hours of training to be certified with the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF) and registered with the Michigan Crisis Response Association (MCRA) as an internal C.I.S.M. team. The composite of the team consists of five Command Officers, nine Sworn Deputies, six Dispatchers, and four Correction Deputies.

In addition to Peer Support, we have developed relationships with seven independent counselors that have specialized training and or experience with first responders. These counselors work with all county insurance and offer a wide range of services to fit our employee's needs.



COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

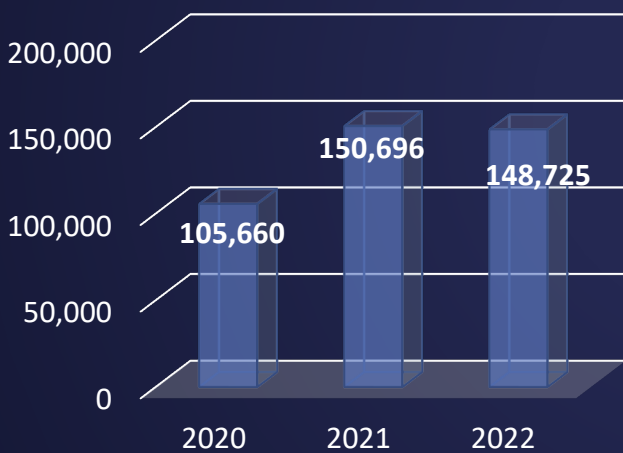


Macomb County Community Corrections is a community-based sanction and rehabilitative program aimed at relieving prison and jail overcrowding through Court-approved sentencing alternatives. Non-violent offenders are placed into community sanctions, rather than in jail or prison to allow for corrections space for more serious offenders.

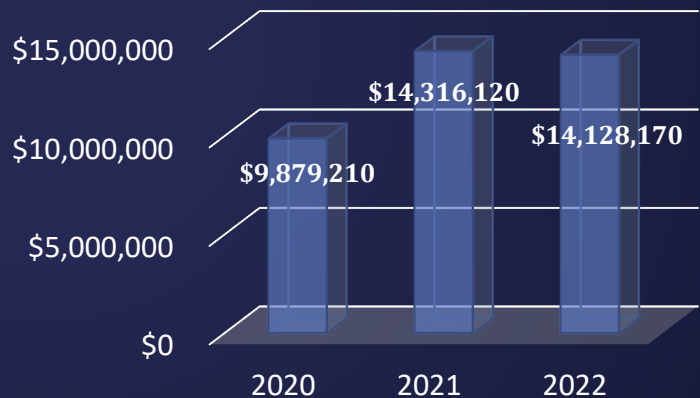
Community Corrections has continued with all previously provided services to include Inmate assessments, pretrial risk and needs screenings, jail diversions to inpatient and community-based group programming, community service programs, pretrial supervision, drug testing, and electronic monitoring programs.

Community Corrections continues to assist Jail Administration daily with communication to courts for releases based on need assessment. Community corrections also provides pre-arraignment and pre-trial assessments.

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS MISSION STATEMENT:

Macomb County Community Corrections mission is to provide effective, local, community-based alternatives to incarceration that promote public safety, hold offenders accountable, and improve their ability to live lawfully and productively in the community.

JAIL MINISTRY



The Macomb County Jail Ministry Team has two onsite chaplains that coordinate over 60 volunteers for religion-based counseling, services, and distribute literature weekly inside the facility. Bible studies, one-on-one ministries are provided continually for those who request them. This past year, the ministry conducted 308 Bible Studies (with 1,633 inmates in attendance) and 1,380 contacts were made during the one-on-one meetings.



The Chaplain's office also provides items for the inmates who are indigent: 889 envelopes, 54 bus tickets, 577 Bibles, 4 Qurans, 287 reading glasses and an innumerable amount of paper, pencils and books were given in the year of 2022.

Every year, with the help of our Catholic friends, the Chaplain's office passes out Easter Bags and Christmas Bags (containing Daily Bread, snacks, and candy) to every inmate and staff working during the holiday seasons. This year at Christmas, due to a generous donor, we were able to pass out socks in the Christmas bag to every inmate.

An arm of the jail ministry has also provided clothing to those who are leaving the jail and reintegrating back into society.



MEDICALLY ASSISTED TREATMENT (MAT)



The MAT Program began in July 2019 through a grant with the Macomb County Sheriff's Office Substance Abuse. This program coordination is with Macomb County Community Corrections and works in conjunction with Sacred Heart.

In 2022, we worked with Wellpath to develop a MAT expansion program that addressed potential participants that did not qualify for the grant funded Sacred Heart program. The expansion program was implemented in July of 2022.

MAT had 159 new enrollments / 175 Total, which equated to 113 completed successful clients, 21 had neutral completion codes (example, removed self to go to inpatient treatment) and unfortunately 13 were discharged due to program rule violations.



MAIL ROOM

In 2022, there were 7,731 pieces of mail that were screened / scanned through our "Verovision" mail screener, a 21.36 % decrease from 2021. There were 11 drug detections made, which is a 38.89 % decrease from 18 drug detections in 2021. All drug detections were forwarded to our Detective Bureau and SET division for a thorough investigation.

In 2022, narcotic laced mail investigations resulted in one conviction of controlled substance delivery and furnishing contraband to a prisoner. The effectiveness of the mail screening process continues to be apparent in the reduction of drugs being smuggled in our jail.

The mail room also processed 714 books mailed in for inmates and 884 pieces of mail that were rejected due to policy violations.

The mail room also receives all administrative mail for the MCSO, to ensure safety of all incoming mail for the facility.



RESERVE UNITS & VOLUNTEERS



RESERVE UNITS



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office has a large, multi-faceted reserve deputy program. This volunteer workforce is managed by the department Command Officers. However, the hours donated by the civilian volunteers are reported to the office of the Administrative Lieutenant. These monthly statistics are compiled and forwarded to the Macomb County Emergency Management and reported under the "Volunteers in Police Services" (V.I.P.S.) program.

By capturing and reporting this information, the Macomb County Emergency Management Department applies for and qualifies grant funding under the LPT (Local Planning Team).

There are eight distinct units: A.C.E., ATV, Aviation, Cyber Crimes, Marine, Mountain Bike, Mounted, and Motorcycle. Two other volunteer groups who donate their time to serve the citizens of Macomb County are Senior Volunteers and Explorers. EXPLORERS



The post has been in existence since 1978. The post is affiliated with the Boy Scouts of America, Great Lakes Council. The post includes students from all over Macomb County and provides young adults (ages 14 - 20) with the opportunity to learn about careers in law enforcement. The program allows participants the opportunity to explore a career in law enforcement by working with the Sheriff's Office and other local law enforcement agencies. Although not all explorers pursue this career, it provides them with a better understanding of the Laws that govern our society. It also provides the explorers with "hands on" experience relating to the field of law enforcement and corrections.

The goal of the program is to educate young men and women about law enforcement through classroom instruction, practical exercises and community service. The curriculum is meant to help the explorer decide if the field of law enforcement is right for them, develop team building and provide a solid foundation for which they can build a future career.

The Explorer program is once again growing from its shutdown during COVID. In 2022, the Explorers attended 32 meetings and events, volunteering over 620 hours of community service to the citizens of Macomb County. Note: Explorers are not licensed law enforcement officers and do not have authority to make arrests.



Application Requirements

- Must be between the ages of 14 and 20
- Must maintain a "C" average in school and be in good standing
- No criminal history and a satisfactory driving record
- Be a resident of Macomb County
