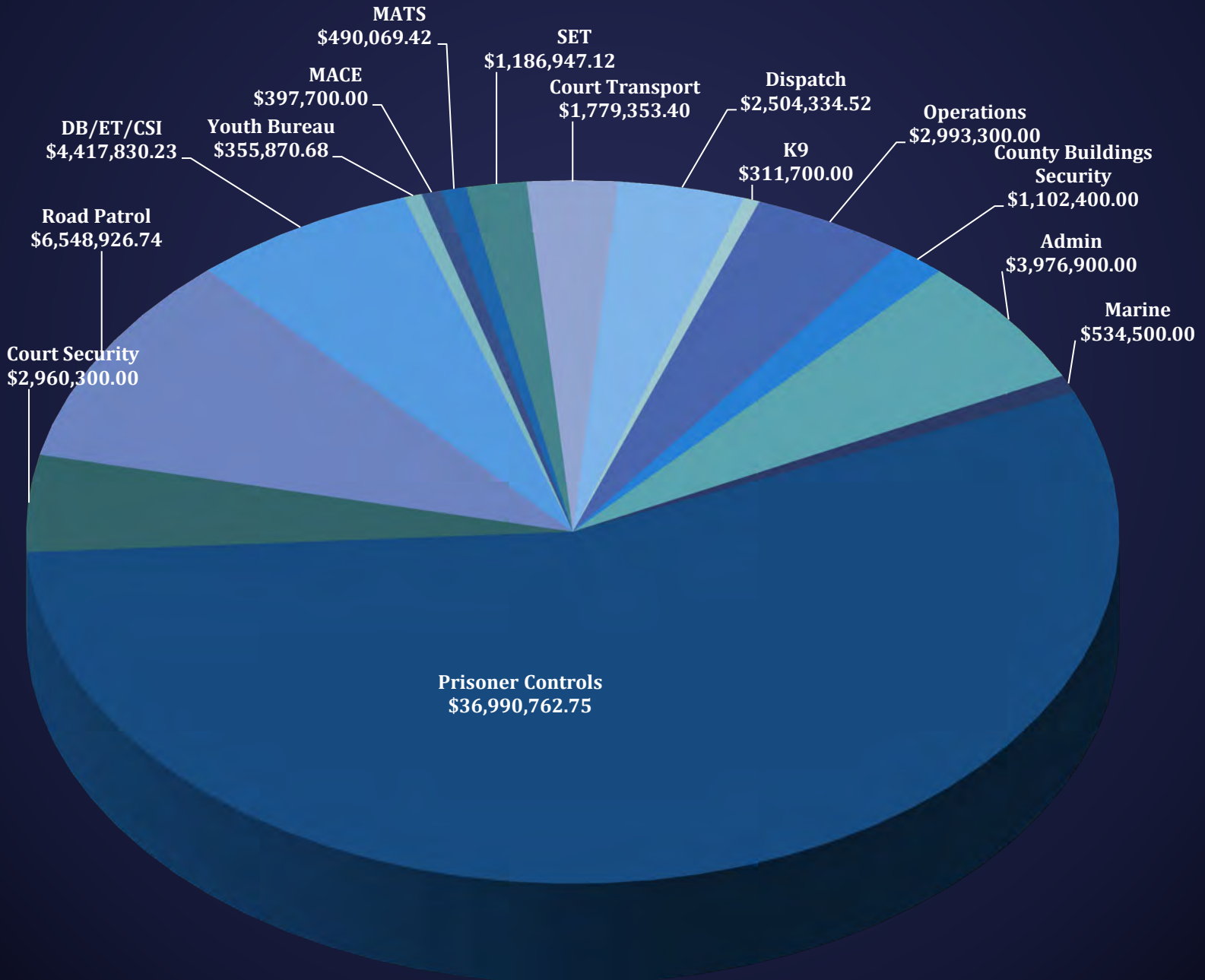

2021 Net Budget (by unit)

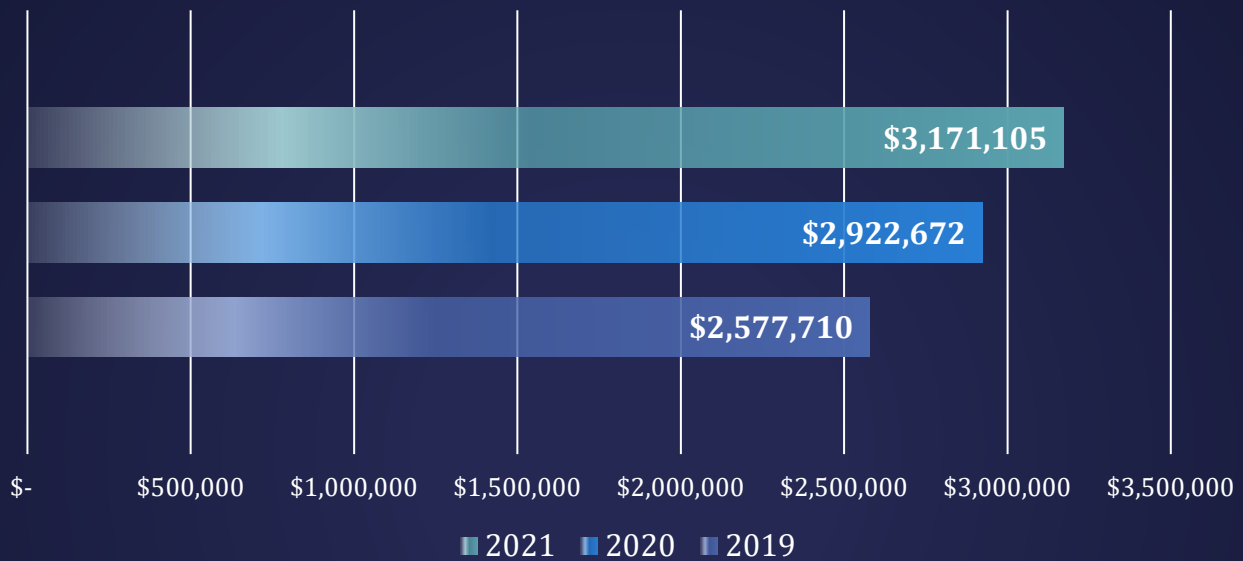

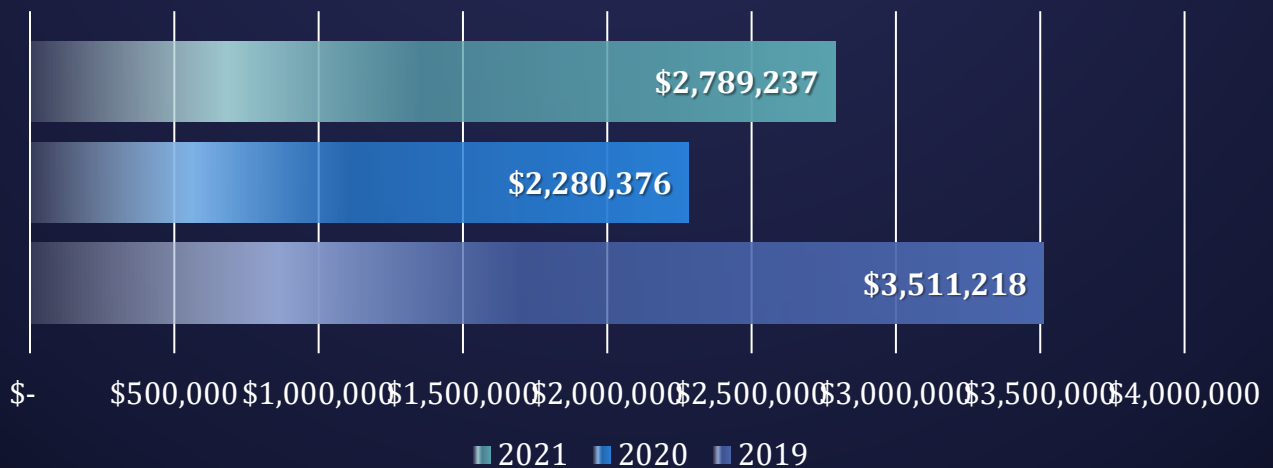

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES



DETECTIVE BUREAU



The Detective Bureau staff is comprised of one (1) Lieutenant, one (1) Administrative Sergeant and two (2) Sergeant team leaders. Each team leader supervises a team of six (6) Detectives. In 2021, the Detective Bureau handled a total of **3,075** cases compared to **3,068** cases in 2020. This represents an increase of **7** cases from 2020.

FRIEND OF THE COURT (F.O.C.)



There are six (6) Deputies assigned to the FOC Enforcement Unit. The FOC Unit works in conjunction with the Friend of the Court to enforce support orders. There are two (2) 2-person arrest teams who actively pursue and arrest those who fail to make court ordered child support payments. Additionally, two (2) FOC Deputies are assigned to the FOC Office who provides intelligence for the two enforcements arrest teams.

YOUTH BUREAU SERVICES



The Youth Bureau is comprised of one (1) Investigator, one (1) D.A.R.E. Officer, and three (3) School Resource Officers (S.R.O.). The S.R.O. Deputies are assigned to the Chippewa Valley and Romeo School Districts. The Deputies assigned to the Youth Bureau are supervised by the Detective Bureau's North team leader. The Youth Bureau handled **231** cases in 2021. This differs from **151** cases in 2020. This represents an increase of **80** cases in 2021. In the fall of 2021, the Youth Bureau experienced an increase in threats of violence toward schools and/or against individual students within MCSO patrol areas. The timing in which this increase occurred was seemingly correlated to a tragic school shooting that occurred in the neighboring jurisdiction of Oxford located in Oakland County.

A total of **69** threats of violence directed at schools within the jurisdiction of the Sheriff's Office were investigated during the 2021 calendar year. Of the **69** cases, **7** of which had criminal charges authorized for *Intention Threat to Commit Act of Violence against a School*, **4** cases had an authorized criminal charge for *False Threats of Terrorism*, and **0** cases of *False Threat to Bomb*.

Two (2) MCSO S.R.O. Deputies are assigned to the Chippewa Valley Schools, one (1) MCSO S.R.O. Deputy is assigned to the Romeo School District.



One (1) MCSO Deputy is assigned to the Drug Abuse Resistance and Education (D.A.R.E.) position. During a typical school year, this Deputy facilitates education to students in the Chippewa Valley, Mt. Clemens, and Utica School Districts as well as to four (4) private schools. During 2021, **140** students graduated from the DARE program during the winter semester, **116** students graduated from the program during the spring semester, and **189** students graduated from the DARE program in the fall semester. The total number of DARE graduates during the calendar year of 2021 was **445**.

POLYGRAPH



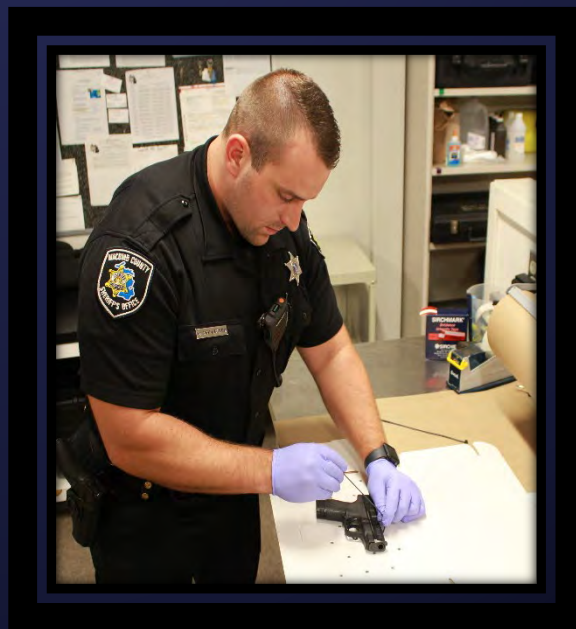
There is one (1) MCSO Deputy assigned as the Polygraph Operator for the Sheriff's Office. This Deputy is responsible for conducting polygraphs for MCSO investigators, other police agencies, and for the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office as requested. Upon special requests, this Deputy is required to travel to other agencies to conduct polygraphs. There were 93 polygraph cases scheduled in 2021. Of the 93 cases, 21 were cancelled and 9 were not conducted due to subjects failing to appear, 12 were noted as non-suitable exams and 4 examinees refused to be examined. Due to COVID-19, For 2021, the polygraph Deputy continued to assist the Office of Professional Standards with jail related criminal cases and oversaw 187 criminal cases that occurred within the confines of the jail. The polygraph deputy also assisted the MCSO Detective Bureau by conducting 3 job application background investigations.



EVIDENCE TECHNICIANS

The primary role of Evidence Technicians at a crime scene is the collections, preservation and processing of evidence. They not only function in that capacity of the Sheriff's Office, but also assist other local law enforcement agencies as requested. This year, they handled 16, 528 total transfers of all property items in property room. The Evidence Technician Property Room Deputy empties the medication drop box located at the MCSO lobby command desk twice per week. An estimated 60 pounds of medication are incinerated monthly.

Evidence Technicians were requested to incident scenes to assist by using the *FARO* for 3D scene imaging for a total of 51 scenes. Of the 51 scenes in which the *FARO* was used, 11 of which were for other law enforcement agencies.



SHERIFF ENFORCEMENT TEAM (S.E.T.)



The Sheriff's Enforcement Team (S.E.T.) provides undercover police services working under the authority of Macomb County Sheriff Anthony Wickersham. Detectives assigned to S.E.T. conduct narcotics related investigations, apprehend fugitives, conduct surveillance, and investigate high profile cases which may include homicide, robberies, residential break-ins and assaultive crimes. To complete the mission, detectives rely on crime reports, anonymous tips, confidential informants, information collected electronically, and established traditional methods of police work.

Bureaus within the S.E.T. unit include the narcotics bureau, County of Macomb Enforcement Team (C.O.M.E.T.), U.S. Marshal task force (D.F.A.T.), Macomb Area Computer Enforcement (M.A.C.E.), two Drug Enforcement Agency task forces (DEA-Group 8 and FANTOM), and a Federal Bureau of Investigations task force. In 2021, a total of sixteen Sheriff's personnel were assigned to these various units. This consists of one Lieutenant, three Sergeants and twelve Deputies.



During 2021, S.E.T. units investigated in excess of 1,900 cases, executed 85 physical search warrants and 264 administrative search warrants related to electronic forensics. These investigations resulted in 263 arrests, which included Child Sexually Abusive Activity cases, narcotics related cases, narcotic related jail cases, homicide, home invasions, armed robberies and violent felony warrant arrests.

The S.E.T unit seized and forfeited over \$261,000 in cash and property. Narcotics worth approximately \$276,654 were taken off the streets of Macomb County. These numbers are less than in years past due to changes in state forfeiture laws and the subsequent changes in forfeiture policy of the prosecutor's office. COVID affected certain narcotics activity; border restrictions, shutdowns, stay-at-home orders, etc., impacted the drug trade and the supply chain was partially disrupted.

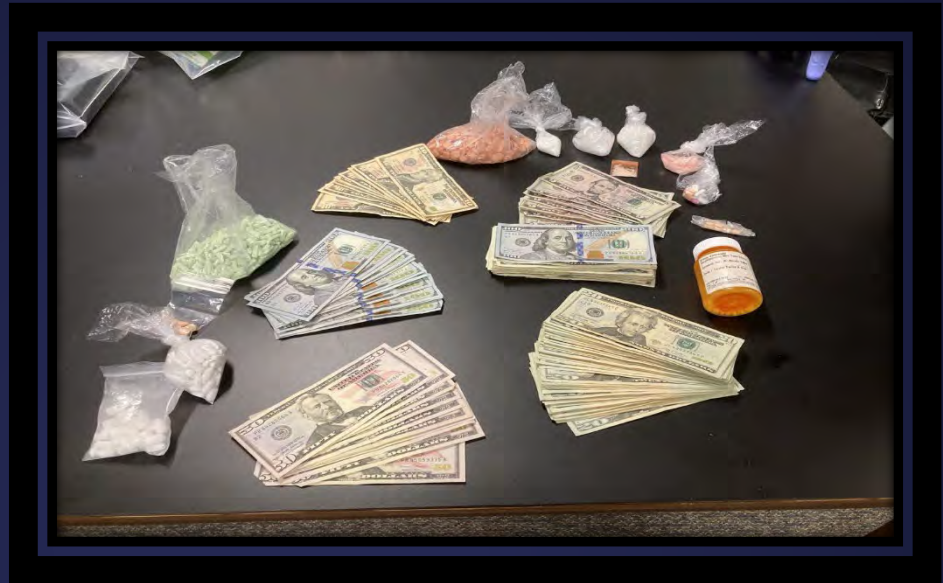
As a result of the Sheriff assigning personnel to federal task forces, we received over \$76,146 in equitable sharing from the Federal Asset Forfeiture system.



DRUG ENFORCEMENT AGENCY (DEA)



The Sheriff's Enforcement Team has personnel assigned to two Drug Enforcement Agency task forces. S.E.T personnel assigned to these task forces (DEA-Group 8 and FANTOM) conduct covert investigations that typically reach beyond the southeast Michigan region: into and across the United States and beyond the U.S. border. During 2021, the DEA reimbursed the Sheriff's Office approximately \$30,000.00 in overtime costs.



FUGITIVE APPREHENSION



The Sheriff's Enforcement Team has personnel assigned to the U.S. Marshal Apprehension team. Personnel assigned to this unit focus on violent criminals that either reside or have committed crimes in Macomb County. Being involved in this unit give our Deputies authority to conduct apprehension investigations beyond our county and have jurisdiction nationwide. During 2021, the U.S. Marshals reimbursed the Sheriff's Office approximately \$35,000 in overtime costs.

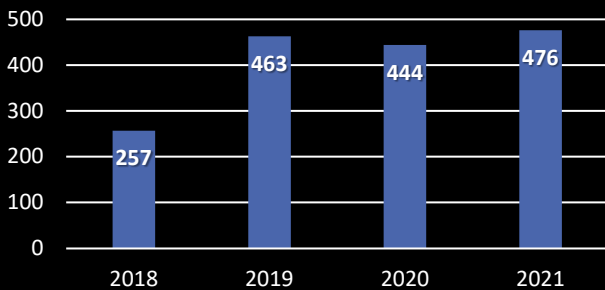


MACOMB AUTO THEFT SQUAD (M.A.T.S.)



The Macomb Auto Theft Squad (M.A.T.S.) is a multi-jurisdictional task force comprised of investigators from the Macomb County Sheriff's Office, Centerline Department of Public Safety, Clinton Township Police Department, Eastpointe Police Department, Roseville Police Department, Shelby Township Police Department, St. Clair Shores Police Department, Sterling Heights Police Department, and the Warren Police Department. The unit's manpower totals eleven (11) Detectives and one (1) full time Office Assistant Senior. In addition, the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office received funding to provide a full-time assistant prosecutor to the squad to prosecute all cases generated by M.A.T.S. and to initiate forfeiture proceedings as mandated by law. The Macomb Auto Theft Squad investigates auto theft and its related crimes including insurance fraud.

Vehicles Recovered by M.A.T.S. 2021

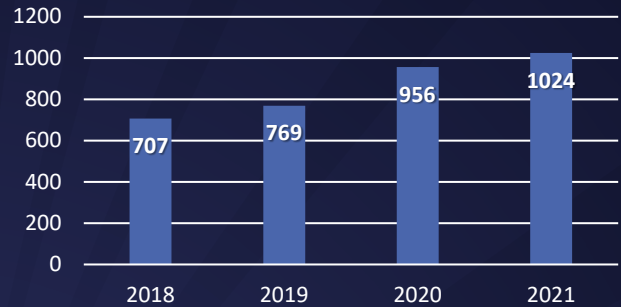


In 2021, M.A.T.S. Detectives conducted 1024 investigations that include but are not limited to Car Jacking, UDAA, LFA, and Fraudulent Activities. The M.A.T.S. Detectives recovered approximately **\$8,366,296** in vehicle recoveries which were returned back to the insurance companies and victims.



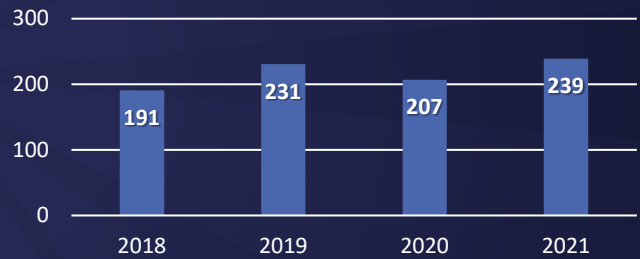
The Macomb Auto Theft Squad receives funding from the Michigan Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA). The ATPA is funded by an annual assessment on automobile insurance companies at \$1 per motor vehicle including passenger and commercial motor vehicles. Since the inception of the ATPA in 1986, auto thefts in Michigan has decreased by 62%. Nationally, thefts have decreased by almost 40% as well. ATPA's success in the battle against auto theft is the direct result of dedication and efforts of the men and women who are a part of law enforcement agencies, prosecutor offices, and community organizations.

Cases Initiated by M.A.T.S. 2021

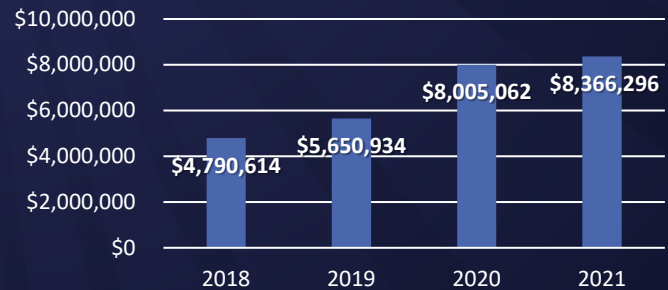


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Total Arrests By M.A.T.S. 2021

MACOMB AREA COMPUTER ENFORCEMENT (M.A.C.E.)



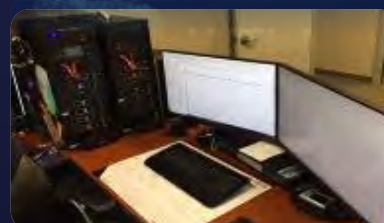
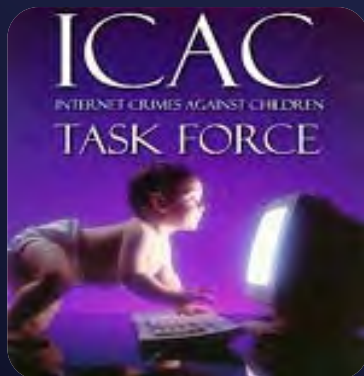
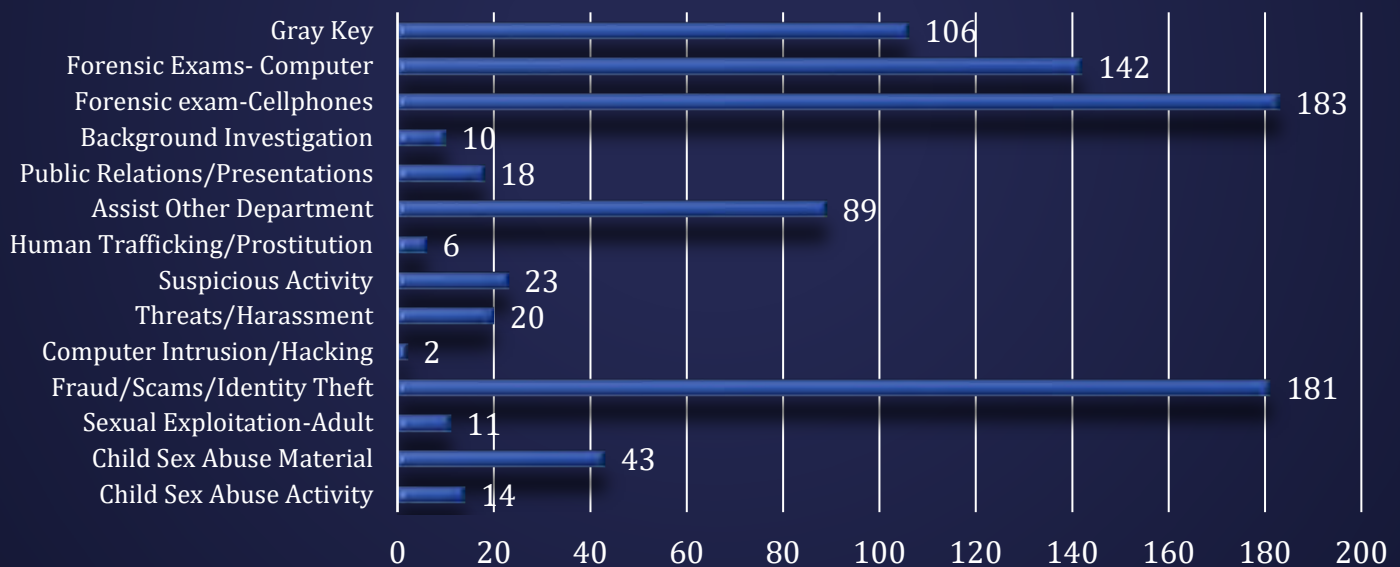
The Macomb Area Computer Enforcement unit (M.A.C.E.) is a computer crime task force assigned to investigate computer crimes such as computer fraud, identity theft, and child sexual exploitations. This year, the unit opened 848 cases and arrested 5 subjects for various criminal activities.

Computer crimes are often difficult to investigate due to crossing jurisdictional lines, as well as the increase in communication technology available: such as smart phones and on-line games through which children are solicited. M.A.C.E investigators assist other local law enforcement agencies with computer crime investigations.

M.A.C.E. maintains a partnership with Michigan ICAC (Internet Crimes Against Children).

M.A.C.E. continues to assist with education and prevention endeavors in local schools educating all grade levels of students, teachers and parents regarding cyber-crime and safe use of the Internet. M.A.C.E also presents internet safety seminars for senior citizen and church groups.

SPECIAL WEAPONS AND TACTICS (S.W.A.T.)



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office SWAT team is a tactical team that operates through a cooperative effort with the Chesterfield Township Police Department, Eastpointe Police Department, Utica Police Department, Fraser Department of Public Safety, and New Baltimore Police Department. The Macomb County Sheriff's SWAT team assists departmental personnel and outside agencies during circumstances that involve potentially life-threatening situations. Responses include but are not limited to the following: Barricaded subject(s), sniping incidents, search and arrest warrants when considered high-risk (likelihood of armed or combative subjects), CBRNE terrorist events, hostage situations, workplace and school violence situations, executive protection.

The Macomb County Sheriff S.W.A.T. team is comprised of Law Enforcement personnel from Macomb County Sheriff's Office, Chesterfield Township, Utica, Eastpointe, New Baltimore and Fraser Police Departments, and Medstar personnel giving us a total of twenty-seven (27) S.W.A.T. operators and two (2) medical personnel.

In the year 2021, the Macomb County Sheriff S.W.A.T. Team received one call for service. On March 21st the Team was called out to Oakland County to assist the Oakland County Sheriff's S.W.A.T. team. A typical annual training schedule for the Macomb County Sheriff S.W.A.T. team consists of two days of training per month, one week of specialized training per year, and one week of refresher training in Camp Grayling Michigan at the Northern Michigan Law Enforcement Training Group (NMLETG).



FIRE INVESTIGATION UNIT



During 2021, a total of 17 fires were investigated resulting in 7 deemed undetermined, 4 determined accidental, 5 determined incendiary or arson and 1 was too unsafe to investigate. The team continued with ongoing training for all unit members to keep current on the changes in the fire investigation field with NFPA 921 and NFPA 1033.

The Fire Investigation Unit continues to provide a much needed service to Macomb County residents as well as a valuable service to the local fire departments in our community.

CRASH INVESTIGATIONS UNIT (C.I.U.)



A team of six (3 deputies and 3 Sergeants) make up the Crash Investigation Unit. The Crash Investigation Unit was activated 32 times in 2021. Of the 32 activations, 23 were MCSO fatalities, nine were serious injury crashes, and four were crash investigations for outside agencies.

Four full crash reconstructions were completed and charges were authorized waiting for court proceedings. In 2021, the Crash Investigation Unit had one fatal crash trial from 2018 (Cass Avenue), involving a car versus pedestrian/ crossing guard. Judge Marlinga returned a guilty verdict for driving on a suspended license causing death.

Additionally, crash team services were requested by the City of Warren and Clinton Township to conduct crash investigations; services requested to review and assist with Bosch CDR downloads and training by Shelby Township Police and Warren Police; and crash team services were requested to cover for Clinton Township Police for a period of two weeks.

The Crash Investigation Unit utilized our UAV drone aerial footage with our FARO scans for a complete professional deliverable for 11 crash investigations. Currently, we are the only Crash Investigation Unit that utilizes both Pix4D along with our FARO scans in the entire State of Michigan.



TRAINING DIVISION



The Training Division facilitates all training for Macomb County Sheriff's Office, both in-service and advanced training at various locations. This includes new hires, promotions, and record tracking required by the state. In addition, the Training Division is responsible for recruitment, facilitating presentations, and jail tours to various community groups.

The Administrative Lieutenant maintains oversight of the Sheriff's Office Training Bureau and the Firearms Unit & Armory. There are two sergeants assigned to training, one sergeant and one deputy (special assignment) to firearms and one secretary that assists the lieutenant and sergeants.

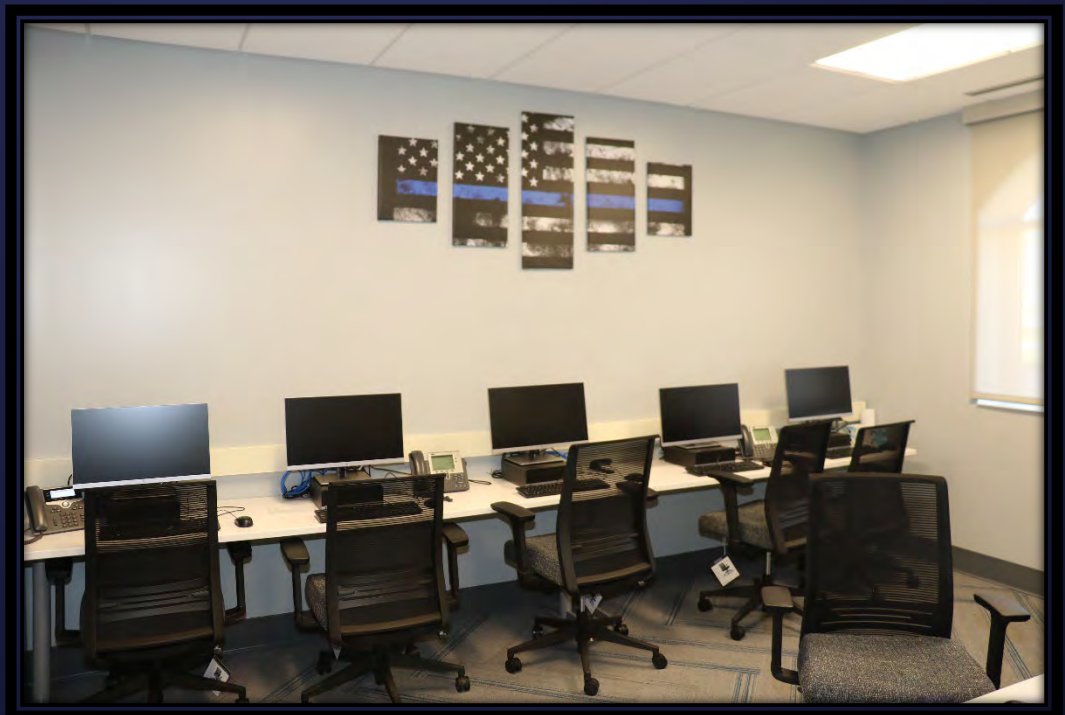
Among the responsibilities on the Administrative Lieutenant is to monitor compliance of the 20 Hour Training Requirement. The Training Bureau coordinates the training to assure that our employees meet the qualifications set forth by Michigan Sheriff's Coordinating and Training Council.

In 2021, the Sheriff's Office had a combined total of 27,980 hours of training for its personnel.

The Training Bureau is proud to report that 100% compliance was achieved for the mandatory 20-hour training requirement. In 2021, the bureau utilized online computer-based training to assist in achieving the 20-hour training requirement mandated by the Michigan Sheriff's Coordination and Training Council.

In 2021 the Training Bureau was involved in several upgrades and projects:

- Firearms qualified over 700 people
- Distributed new patrol rifles and shotguns
- Trained staff and distributed the Taser 7
- New focus on Use of Force
- Updates to the gun range and classroom
- Restructure the Corrections Training Officer program
- Purchased fire simulator equipment



FIREARMS TRAINING DIVISION

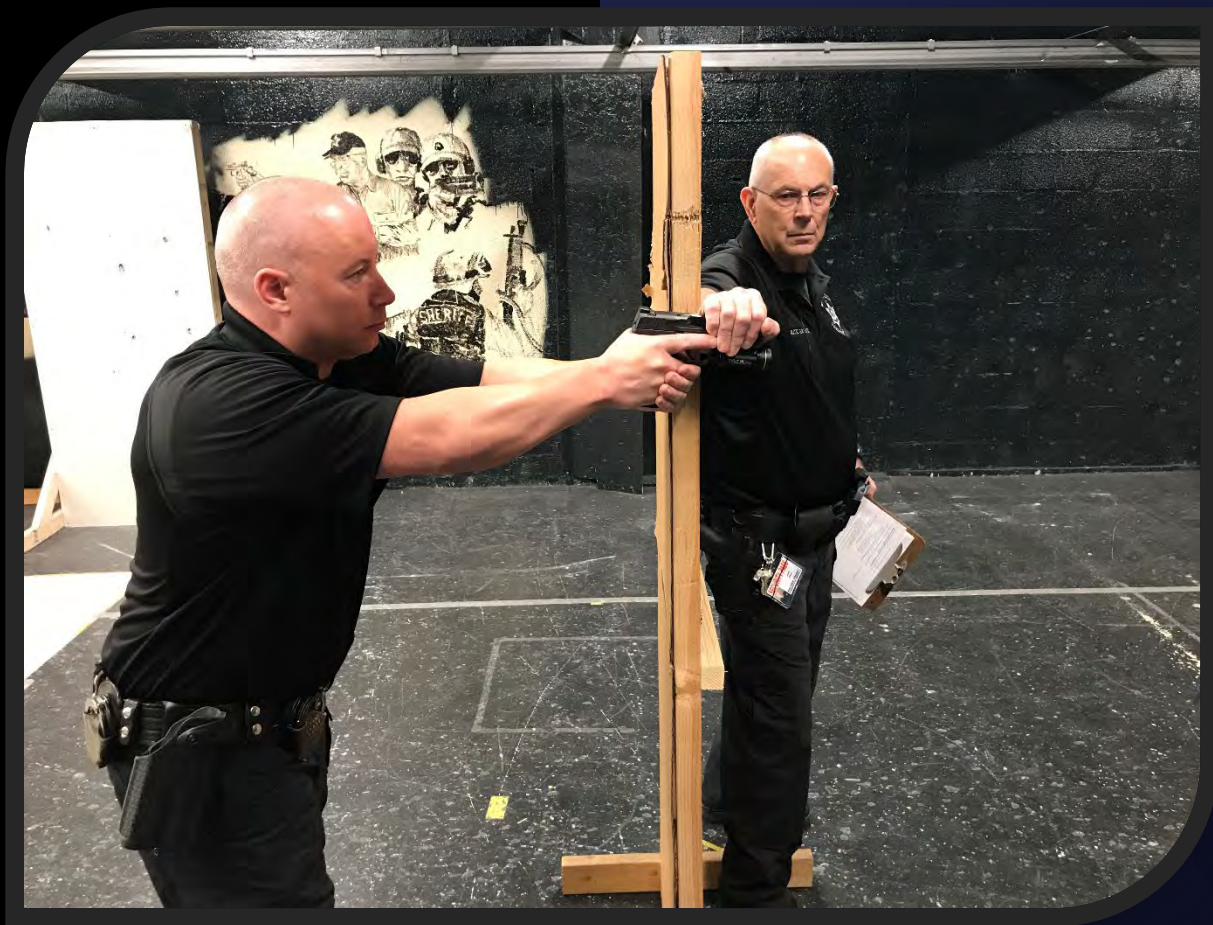


The Firearms Division qualified over 700 people on the range this year. Over 40,000 pistol rounds were fired. A new qualification course was created that incorporated the use of the pistol, patrol rifle and shotgun. This course also has weapon malfunction drills, transition drills, threat assessment and shoot don't shoot drills.

The agency purchased new patrol rifles for every patrol deputy. Along with these rifles new shotguns were purchased and deployed into the patrol cars. The TI Simulator was reassembled and updated in 2021.

2021 brought the return of PPCT for Use of Force. 15 Use of Force instructors were created to help roll out this program. The agency purchased 6 use of force dummies to assist in training. These dummies allow for the officers to train with a dummy rather than another officer. This cuts down on potential for training injuries as well as transmission of COVID. Corrections and road patrol were both trained in the classroom as well as hands on practical application of PPCT in 2021.

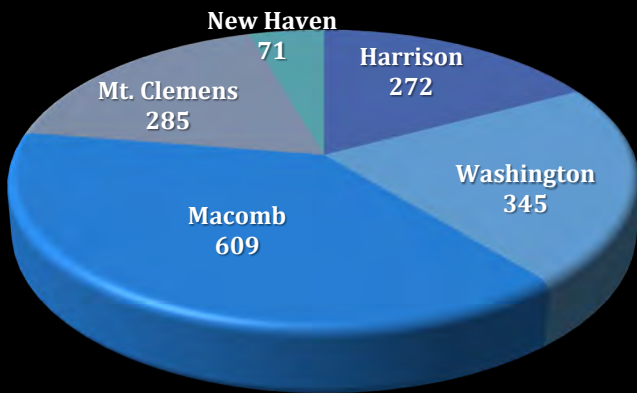
A new reserve deputy academy was run in October of 2021. The academy not only had new reserve deputies for Macomb County but St. Clair County as well. The 15 new reserve deputies were trained in Firearms, First Aid, Report Writing, Radio Communications, Traffic Control / Special Events, Use of Force / Subject Control, Handcuffing and Chemical Spray certification.



LIQUOR ENFORCEMENT



LIQUOR INSPECTIONS



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office, under the authority of PA 58 of 1998, enforces the provisions of the statute of the Michigan Liquor Control Code. The responsibilities granted to the sheriff include:

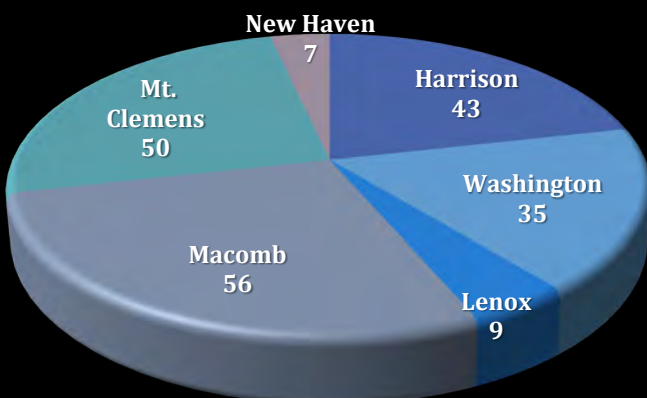
- 1) Inspections of licensed establishments.
- 2) Conducting criminal background checks on all new and transfer liquor license applications.
- 3) Ensuring that the building housing the licensed establishment meets local code.
- 4) Granting special one-day liquor licenses.
- 5) Conducting investigation at licensed establishments targeting the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors.

In addition to the duties assigned to deputies in our patrol areas, they also conduct inspections of licensed liquor establishments throughout the year. These inspections are done randomly and verify that the licensees are operating within the guidelines established by the Liquor Control Commission.

The Sheriff's Office also receives requests by the Liquor Control Commission to investigate complaints that are filed directly with the L.C.C. Many of these complaints involve a suspension or the placing "in escrow" of a liquor license due to lack or proper documentation (insurance certificates), or the temporary suspension due to the seasonal nature of the business by the licensee.

In 2021, twelve special permits were issued to non-profit groups wishing to sell alcoholic beverages at special events within the Macomb Sheriff's patrol jurisdiction.

CIVIL DIVISION



The Civil Division falls under the direction of the Macomb County Sheriff's Office. The Civil Division which is contracted through the county to a private business, Civil Staffing Resources LLC, is responsible for the serving of legal papers, such as subpoenas or Personal Protection Orders of the Court and the home foreclosure auction, as prescribed by State Law.

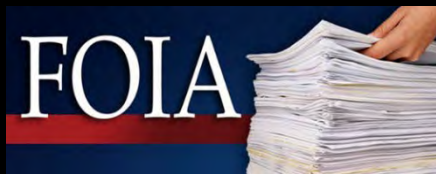
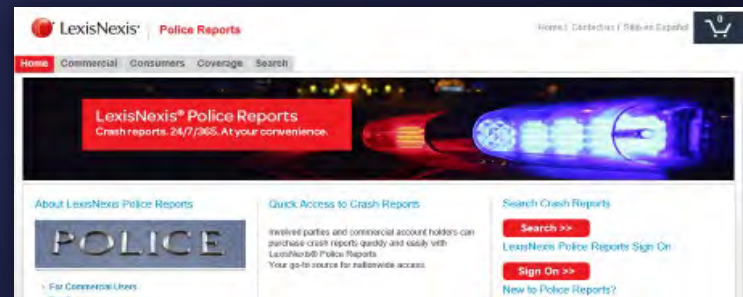

The Uniform Services Division includes a Traffic Bureau, Court Security, Prisoner Transport, Canine (K-9) Unit, Marine Division, Dive Team, Reserve Deputies, and Fleet Management. In addition to these units, *Uniform Services* are responsible for handling all special events that require additional staffing.

Six communities' contract with the Macomb County Sheriff's Office for 24/7 police services. Emergency response is provided in four townships that do not have police departments. Harrison Twp Substation

In Fall of 2021, Harrison Twp Deputies moved into a new substation located at 30360 South River. This location was previously being used as storage for the Water & Sewer Department. The building underwent significant upgrades including but not limited to, brand new office space, locker rooms, a public meeting room, public restroom, indoor patrol vehicle storage, in addition to state-of-the-art technical infrastructure. Deputies will be able to call this location home for several years to come.

Macomb Township Substation

On September 8th, 2021, Macomb Twp Deputies began operating out of the new, state-of-the-art Joseph E. Koss Public Safety Building, located at 19925 23 Mile Road. This 37,000 sq.ft. newly constructed building is designed to accommodate 60 deputies plus 25 firefighters while serving the community for the next 50 years.

DISPATCH CENTER



The Dispatch Center operates out of the COMTEC building located in Clinton Township, Michigan. As of December 31, 2021, Macomb County Dispatch had 1 Communications Administrator, 4 Dispatch Supervisors and 54 full time Dispatchers. The Sheriff's Office is budgeted for 59 Dispatchers; and is currently working on filling additional vacancies.

In 2021, Dispatch hired 19 new dispatch employees, 10 resigned, 1 was reclassified, 2 were terminated and 2 were promoted. We are excited for the 2022 year and look forward to additional new hires. In April of 2021, the Dispatch Training Site was completed and fully operational. The training center is located inside the Technical Service building off Dunham (radio repair). We were successful in building a fully functional, simulated dispatch training environment that is all our own. This center is unique to our needs including a creative and functional space to learn and train. There are five dispatch consoles and one instructor console, including a 70-inch monitor for course material display.

DISPATCH CENTER



As defined in Michigan Legislature, Dispatchers in the state are required to complete initial training courses to fulfill Module I and Module II as well as continue education to remain compliant. Module I consist of a 40-hour basic telecommunicator training course approved by the State 911 Committee (SNC) and must be completed within 18 months of hire. Within 24 months of hire, Dispatchers must complete Module II, a 40-hour advanced training course approved by the SNC. Once training requirements are completed a telecommunicator is considered designated. Designated Dispatchers are required to complete 24 hours of training every 24 months. If a designated Dispatcher fails to complete training required, the SNC will issue a noncompliance notification to the agency which can potentially result in loss of training funds. MCSO Dispatchers are fully compliant with state required training standards and policies. In addition to state required training all MCSO staff must remain agency compliant on EMD certifications as well as CPR/AED and Basic First AID.

All staff also completes monthly, web-based training, provided by Police Legal Sciences. PLS awards Dispatchers 1 credit per completed monthly lesson, totaling 12 credits per year. PLS training keeps all staff compliant by meeting the requirement of 24 credits every 2 years. Any additional outside training is counted toward continuing education credit as well.



DISPATCH CENTER



House Bill 5026 (HB5026) was introduced in mid-June and sponsored by Representative Julie Calley. This bill was drafted to renew the 911 Enabling Act (PA 32) which included changes to the current statute. It was referred to the Communications and Technology Committee in the House, passing both the House Committee and House in October. The Bill was referred to the Senate Energy and Technology Committee on November 2 and passed without amendments on November 9. Following the passing of the Senate, The Governor signed the bill on December 15, 2021.

This bill ensured our funding for the 911 network and is secure through 2027. This was a very large undertaking that involved many 911 Directors, Public Safety Personnel, and the MCDA (Michigan Communications Directors Association) throughout the draft process. 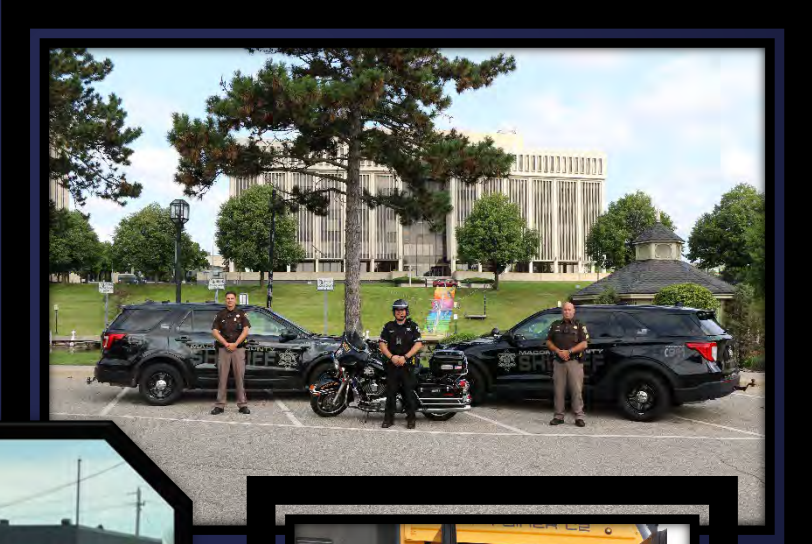

TRAFFIC BUREAU



The 2021 Macomb County Sheriff's Office Traffic Bureau consisted of 1 Sergeant, 2 Deputies (funded through the Secondary Road Patrol Grant - 416 Grant) and a County funded Motor Carrier Deputy. Traffic Bureau personnel are responsible for responding to accidents, patrolling secondary roads, traffic enforcement, special events and education to the public on installing child safety seats. The Motor Carrier Deputy was responsible for enforcing motor carrier laws and complaints for the entire County and abandoned vehicles in our patrol areas.

The Macomb County Traffic Bureau was responsible for traffic details for the Detroit Fireworks that were set off at Metro Beach in Harrison Township, Tons of Trucks in Macomb Twp, car cruises in multiple cities, the Santa Parade in Mt. Clemens, and numerous other special events throughout the County.



TRAFFIC BUREAU



Macomb County Sheriff's Office received \$192,592.00 in grant money to conduct seat belt enforcement, drunk/drugged driving enforcement, and intersection enforcement for bicycles and pedestrians. The grant money was split between the Macomb County Sheriff's Office, and Warren, Chesterfield Township, Clinton Township, Shelby Township, St. Clair Shores and Sterling Heights Police Departments. The Traffic Bureau Sergeant was the Project Manager for the grant and was responsible for dispersing the grant money, check log sheets and overtime hours from each department and submitting overtime for reimbursement.

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office also received \$10,000.00 in grant money for the Pedestrian/Bicycle grant for Macomb Township. The grant focused on intersections and the enforcement of Bicycle and Pedestrian walkways. \$8,000.00 of the grant was from OHSP and Macomb Township had a 20% match or \$2000.00. The Traffic Bureau also assisted Warren Police Department with their pedestrian/bike grant during their strategic enforcement.

The County funded Motor Carrier Deputy was responsible for conducting motor carrier complaints, motor carrier inspections and answering complaints received by the Macomb County Road Commission. This deputy is also assigned to process the abandoned vehicles handled by our department. Once the ABAN vehicles are processed, they are sold off at various auctions around the County.

CANINE UNIT (K-9)



During the year, our K9 teams were utilized by our department as well as other agencies through the tri-county area. Our K9 teams were deployed 141 times in 2021. K9 training consists of weekly training with various departments including police tracking, apprehension, article searches, along with detection with explosives and narcotics. Additionally, we train our K9's while at home and while on patrol to keep them to national standards for police departments. The handlers also look for any additional classes or instruction courses that may become available.

All three K9 teams certified with National Association of Professional Canine Handlers. (NAPCH). MCSO narcotic dogs are currently the only and first K9's to be trained in the odor of Soboxone.

In 2022, we are committed to serve our department and the citizens with our K9 partners. We are also committed in assisting other agencies when requested. In addition, our Narcotic K9 teams will consistently sweep the jail on a regular basis. By the end of 2021, we had 3 K9 teams. By adding two or three K9 teams to our department, we will have coverage across all three shifts on a continuous basis by placing at least one team per shift. Historically, MCSO has had up to 7 K9 teams.

The K9 team was deployed 141 times in 2021.



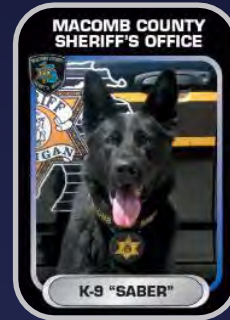

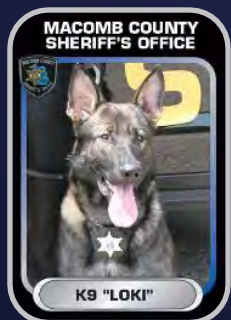

COURT SECURITY



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office Inmate Transport and Court Security Division is responsible to provide safety and security to the judges, courthouse staff, lawyers, inmates and public. This also includes security for the offices of the County Commissioners, Prosecutors, and Treasurer's Office, Friend of the Court, Probate Court, Old County Building, Reimbursement, Probation Department and other ancillary offices of Macomb County within the locations listed above.

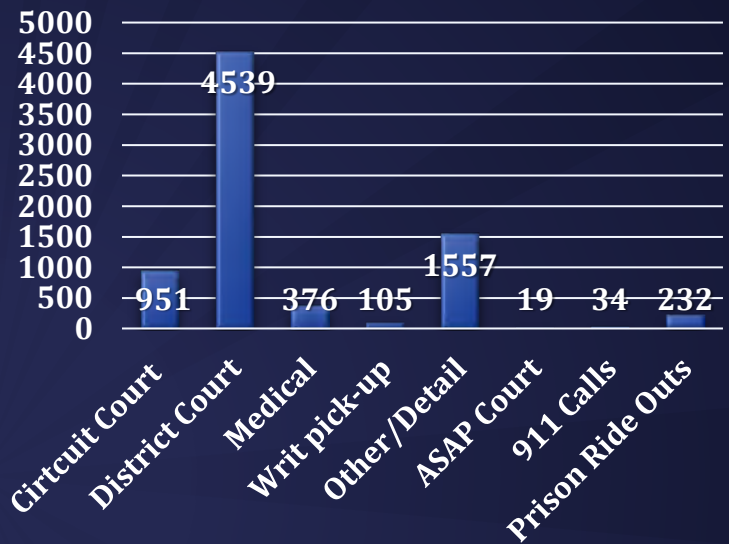
It is the duty of the Protective Service Officers to screen the public of any items that could be considered weapons when entering the county buildings.

This year there were 8 incidents that required Deputy Intervention. These incidents included disorderly persons, mental health interventions and threat towards judicial staff. No individuals were harmed during these issues.

There were no bomb threats or successful prisoner escapes at any of the Macomb County Buildings, district courts or prisoner transport destinations for the year 2021.

The Prisoner Transportation Division and Circuit Court Station Three Lock-up Deputies traveled a total of 179,280 miles in the year 2021. Considering the large number of miles traveled, no major accidents occurred and no deputies, inmates or members of the public were injured in the course of those transports.

HONOR GUARD



The Macomb County Sheriff's Honor Guard has a total of 20 members that dedicate their personal time to attend funerals and memorial services for our brothers and sisters in law enforcement. They participated in 13 details for the year of 2021 compared to 9 details in 2020. The drastic change in number of details is directly related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, in person Police Week was canceled. An important part of our Honor Guard is to maintain a professional relationship with area Honor Guards. Our unit assisted the Clinton Township Police Department with funeral services for Chief Posavetz who died in the line of duty.

During 2021, the units 5 newest members attended DFL Honor Guard Training in Alpena, MI. All financial support has come solely from Honor Guard Members, fundraising, and donations received from citizens. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic our annual Pasta Dinner Fundraiser was canceled. We currently have 1403 followers on the Honor Guard Facebook page.

MOTOR UNIT



The Motorcycle Unit is designed to provide additional tools to aid in patrol, traffic enforcement, and to further protect and serve the citizens of Macomb County. Additionally, motors are utilized in various special events where speed, agility, and precision are required and have assisted with Presidential motorcades across the State of Michigan as well as local events and road closures.

The MCSO Motor Unit currently consists of one sergeant and five certified Deputies. All members passed a rigorous training program to be eligible to operate a motorcycle, conduct traffic stops, and complete tasks in a safe manner.

The Motor Unit was outfitted with new uniforms in 2021 that included armored pants and jackets made from a Kevlar weave and specifically tailored to each member of the unit. New boots specific to motorcycles were also included which better protect the feet and ankles of riders. The previous uniforms afforded no crash or slide protection and were adorned with metal name plates and badges with metal prongs.

The motors themselves consist of six 2012 Harley Electra Glide models. This past year new high intensity lighting was fitted to each motor which replaced dim and outdated lights. Computers, printers, and radar systems have been added to two motors with more on the way. MCSO Motors were deployed to two special events in 2021. MCSO Motors assisted with Clinton Township Police Chief Posavetz's funeral procession and assisted with the Mt Clemens Fireworks.



UNMANNED AERIAL VEHICLE / DRONE (UAV)



The UAV (Unmanned Aerial Vehicle or Drone) Unit is comprised of fourteen sworn deputies and two sworn sergeants totaling sixteen members. All team members possess a current FAA Part 107 Airman's Certificate with a small Unmanned Aircraft System (sUAS) rating. The UAV Unit provides aerial and tactical support for numerous operations within the Sheriff's Office patrol area and surrounding agencies within the county. The primary function of the UAV Unit is search and rescue, but our drones are also utilized for documenting crime scenes, crash scenes, Mobile Field Force support, Marine Division support, K-9 support, Negotiator support, SWAT operations, and public relation demonstrations. The UAV Unit trains on a monthly basis at various indoor and outdoor locations throughout our patrol area.

The Macomb County UAV Unit is currently one of, if not the largest teams of its type in the State of Michigan. We currently have ten drones in our fleet with eight being designated for outdoor use and two for indoor applications. The drones were deployed 41 times this year. Most of the deployments were a search and rescue type situation with the remainder involving the search for a suspect that fled on foot from an incident. Several other deployments included assisting neighboring agencies when they requested drone support.

The drones were also deployed by Evidence Technician Deputy 16 times for crash reconstruction and crime scene documentation. Of the 57 deployments this year, there were zero incidents involving pilot error, equipment failure, or any damage to our equipment.



CRISIS NEGOTIATIONS TEAM (C.N.T.)



The CNT underwent a change of personnel in 2021 as long-time members both retired and were promoted but these positions were filled. The CNT was able to attend the Midwest Hostage Negotiators Conference in Columbus Ohio September 2021. Presenters from across the United States provided information and scenario debrief to better equip our team with recent CNT situations.

The three new members were also able to attend the FBI Basic Hostage Negotiator's 40-hour course. The FBI 40-hour course provides the standard operation procedures for the MCSO CNT. This also provides the up-to-date information for current trends in negotiations.

The CNT team continues to train monthly, correlating with SWAT training day. Live and scenario-based training is scheduled to improve negotiators skill sets. We also met with other county CNT teams and work to have an excellent working relationship with the other county teams.

The CNT continues to use the "836 Technologies" brand CINT (Critical Incident Negotiations Team) Thrown Phone/Command Center equipment. This equipment is compatible with Bluetooth, and Cellular Devices. The 836 equipment includes the ability to complete the FBI HOBAS report for CNT events and provides better monitoring and computer technology.



MOBILE FIELD FORCE (M.F.F.)



The Mobile Field Force unit is designed to provide rapid, organized response to civil disorder, crowd control, or other tactical situations in Macomb County and our surrounding communities as requested. The Macomb County Sheriff's detachment is a company sized multi-jurisdictional team supplemented by Clinton Township, Roseville, Sterling Heights, Warren, Saint Clair Shores, Shelby Township, Eastpointe, Richmond and Port Huron in a multi- task force unit. MFF has 120 members in total.

The Sheriff's component of MFF consists of 32 sworn law enforcement officers committed to this composite county team. Medstar ambulance supports the mobile field force concept with four tactical paramedics. These medics can be used to treat injured persons without delaying necessary lifesaving treatment in the field.

Mobile Field Force's goal is to schedule quarterly training at sites to be determined throughout the county. In 2021, these training dates were affected by deployments and COVID. Funding for equipment and training is off set through grants secured by Macomb County's Office of Emergency Management.



MARINE DIVISION



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office is responsible for patrolling 85 square miles of Lake Saint Clair and connecting rivers. The Sheriff's Office maintains a fleet of vessels that afford the Marine Division to respond to any water-related emergency throughout the county or neighboring jurisdictions. The Marine Division personnel are trained and equipped for open water rescue, maritime law enforcement, homeland security interdiction efforts, and vessel fire suppression.

The Marine Division is staffed with four full time enlisted personnel that includes; one Lieutenant, one Sergeant, and two Deputy Sheriff's. During the summer patrol season, four additional Deputy Sheriff's are assigned to the Marine Division to be deployed as additional afternoon shift enforcement. In addition, the Marine Division has the advantage of having seventy-six Marine Safety Officers that are voluntary dedicated to the Marine Division. These Marine Division reservists are a true force multiplier who provide additional resources for water patrol related activities and public education related events.

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office-Marine Division continues to be one the most visible public safety agencies on Lake St. Clair. The Marine Division continues to log more patrol hours than any other agency on Lake St. Clair and is one of the most active law enforcement marine division in the state.

In addition, the Marine Division continues to be a leader within the State of Michigan in the administration of water safety public education related activities. In the off-season the Marine Division teaches more student water safety courses than any other law enforcement agency in Michigan.



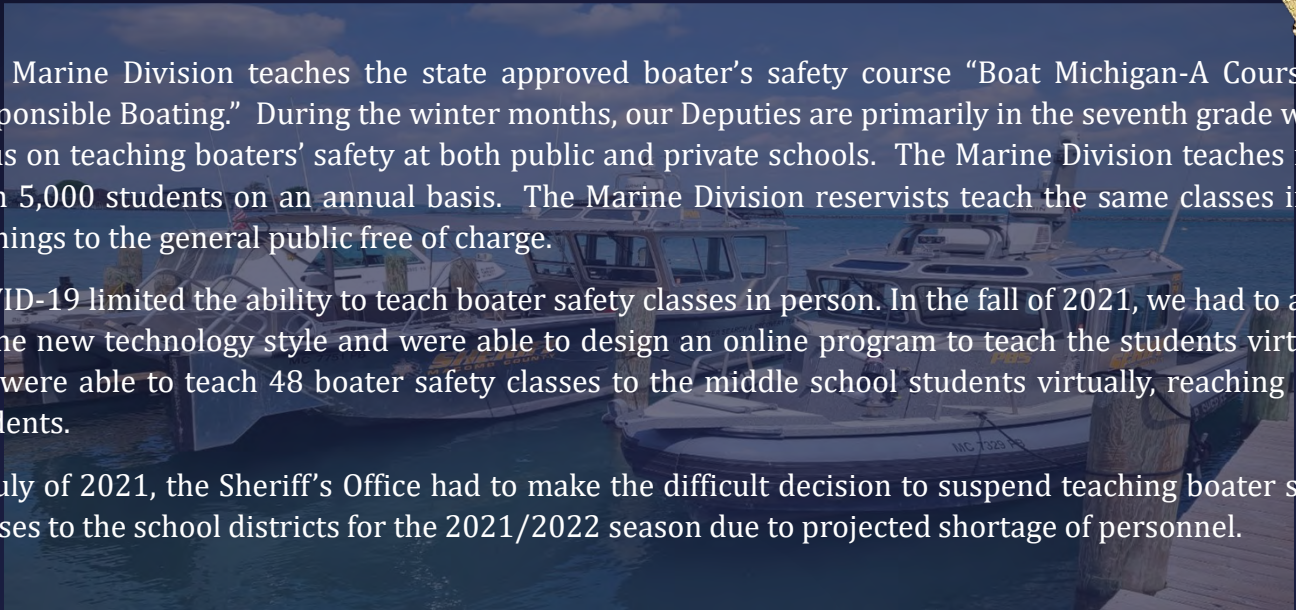
BOATER'S SAFETY INSTRUCTION



The Marine Division teaches the state approved boater's safety course "Boat Michigan-A Course on Responsible Boating." During the winter months, our Deputies are primarily in the seventh grade with a focus on teaching boaters' safety at both public and private schools. The Marine Division teaches more than 5,000 students on an annual basis. The Marine Division reservists teach the same classes in the evenings to the general public free of charge.

COVID-19 limited the ability to teach boater safety classes in person. In the fall of 2021, we had to adapt to the new technology style and were able to design an online program to teach the students virtually. We were able to teach 48 boater safety classes to the middle school students virtually, reaching 2305 students.

In July of 2021, the Sheriff's Office had to make the difficult decision to suspend teaching boater safety classes to the school districts for the 2021/2022 season due to projected shortage of personnel.



DIVE TEAM

The Macomb County Sheriff's Under Water Search and Recovery Team (USRT) is comprised of 13 full time Sheriff's Deputies. These deputies are certified divers through the Professional Association of Dive Instructors (PADI), the largest certifying agency of divers in the world. During 2021, the team trained monthly.

JAIL OPERATIONS



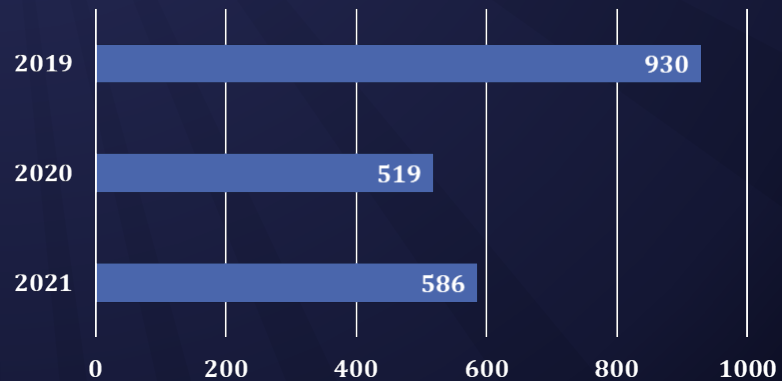
The Macomb County Jail located at Groesbeck and Elizabeth in Mt. Clemens, Michigan is one of the largest correctional facilities in the State of Michigan. The care and custody and maintenance of the 376,551 square foot facility falls under the responsibility of the Jail Administration and Jail Operations team under the direction of Jail Administrator Captain.

In 2021, the COVID-19 pandemic continued to affect operations and administration daily. The jail team worked with Wellpath staff to continue the highest level of attention to safe operations for staff and inmates.

The D-Block, Maximum Security, and Annex areas were taken offline and the rated design capacity was lowered in 2021 from 1201 to 1082 inmates, both male and female. In 2021, there were 10,236 total inmates booked, a 5.43 % increase from the 9708 inmates booked in 2020. Of the 10,236 inmates, 7896 were males, 2340 were females.



2019-2021 Average Daily Population

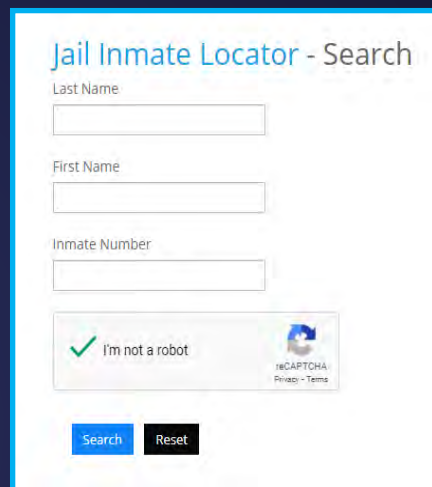
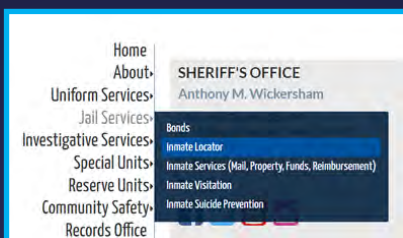


PRISONER INFORMATION



Our Jail Office staff is responsible for inmate tracking for bookings, releases, bonds, transports, court dispositions, sentences, and processing sex offender registrations.

In 2021, our staff added 27,109 charges, disposed of 15,478 charges, added 10,538 holds and added 2, 833 sentences to inmate files.



The Inmate Locator application is available to the public allowing you to check on inmate status, bond information, and visiting information.



VIDEO VISITATION & TABLETS

ICSolutions in the current provider for inmate phones and visitation. Due to COVID-19 considerations, off-site video visitation continued in 2021 at the Macomb County Jail. We continued to offer one free of charge video visitation per week to each inmate.

In 2021, in agreement with ICSolutions, tablets were provided for inmate use throughout the jail. Tablets were issued offer a platform for entertainment as well as electronic kites, Grievances, and messaging. Inmates can steam movies, music, play games, read books, message family and friends for \$.05 a minute.

CLASSIFICATION BUREAU



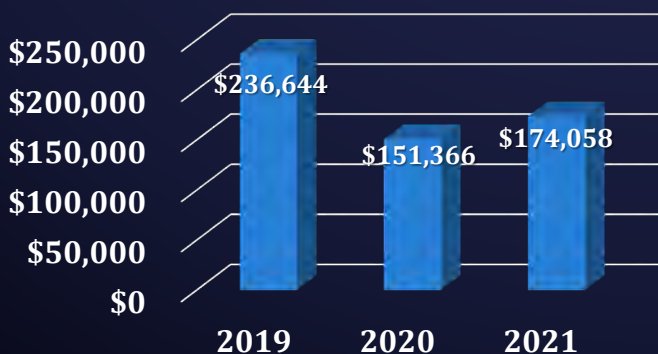
The Macomb County Sheriff's Office utilizes an objective classification plan to provide fair and consistent guidelines in determining prisoner assignments to housing areas, security level, treatment and program services. Original classifications and periodic reviews are performed to accommodate changes in charges, behavior, and to better align the jail population.



JAIL REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

In 1985, the Jail Reimbursement Program was implemented at the Macomb County Jail. The purpose of the program is to seek reimbursement from inmates to help defray the cost of housing. Technological advancements are continually being evaluated in an effort to improve this process and increase the amount of funds recovered.

INMATE HEALTH SERVICES



Our current provider Wellpath is contracted for medical, dental and mental health services. Some of the services include preliminary screening of inmates upon arrival, a comprehensive health evaluation, regularly scheduled sick call, 24-hour nursing coverage, on-site physician visits, hospitalization, medical specialty services and administrative support. Approximately \$5.7 million dollars were spent in 2021 for prisoner healthcare. Wellpath and the Jail team worked daily to respond to changing CDC directives concerning COVID-19 and the overall wellness of the inmate population in 2021.

INMATE FOOD SERVICES

Continental Canteen provides food services for the Macomb County Jail. During the year and because of COVID-19 protocols, there were several changes that occurred. There were times that the kitchen was in operation with emergency Canteen staffing and no trustees. Kitchen trustee help was limited, and meals were served in Styrofoam containers to minimize contact. The meal charge from January 1st – September 24th was \$1.33. For the remainder of the year, September 25th – December 31st, the price increased to \$1.39. During times of emergency, the pricing was \$2.22. The average cost of a meal in 2021 was \$1.51. Continental Canteen also provides commissary services for inmates. In 2021, with the implementation of tablets, the inmates are able to order commissary using tablets.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAM

Clinton Counseling Center Jail Substance Abuse Program is the contracted vendor that provides substance abuse treatment for incarcerated individuals. They are a licensed program designed to assist individuals housed in the Macomb County Jail with overcoming physical and psychological dependence to drugs and alcohol. Treatment services include Fast Track, Reentry Track, and VSAT (Veteran's Substance Abuse and Trauma). Prevention services in the jail include HIV Education, Drug Education and Community Resources, and Opioid/Narcan Education. The Jail Substance Abuse Program also provides community-based Overdose Education and Narcan Distribution programs, such as Narcan Basics, Narcan and Addiction Education, NOPE (Narcan Overdose Prevention Education), and NOPE for Community Mental Health.

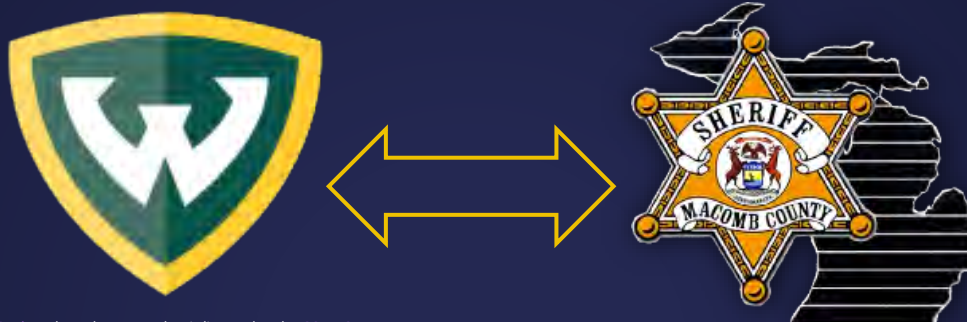

STEPPING UP



Wayne State University Center for Behavioral Health and Justice has partnered with Macomb County in the Stepping Up Initiative. The program is designed to partner up with community mental health agencies, local law enforcement, and jails and prisons across the state to enhance cross-disciplinary collaboration, training, and implementation of evidence-based practices. These partnerships solidify communities' desires to address the needs of those with behavioral health concerns within the criminal justice system by identifying, diverting, and treating individuals with behavioral health concerns and decreasing the burden on jails, families, and communities. Due to COVID-19, this program was suspended in the year 2020 and remained suspended throughout 2021.



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MENTAL HEALTH DIVERSION

The diversion program is facilitated by Macomb County Community Mental Health. The Jail team worked with Macomb County Community Mental Health to identify and divert low level offenders with mental health issues. Community Mental Health has been key in working with the Jail team with mental health, probate, and criminal courts to provide appropriate placement for the inmates with severe mental health issues. The intent of this program is to link offenders with services and support outside of the jail to ensure that all aspects of their mental health treatment is being met.

CORRECTIONS EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (C.E.R.T.)



The Corrections Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.) is trained to deal with unruly uncooperative inmates and riotous situations within the confines of the jail. There were 111 deployments in 2021 vs. 274 deployments in 2020, a 59% decrease. The CERT team has been utilized with inmates who are assaultive and require a restraint chair for safety of inmate and staff. CERT Team has been trained in the use of taser and pepper ball. Currently there are 49 CERT trained Corrections Deputies.

CRISIS INCIDENT STRESS MANAGEMENT (C.I.S.M.)



The Macomb County Sheriff Crisis Incident Stress Management (CISM) Team was formed in the Spring of 2021. The CISM team provides an avenue for peer support and crisis management to MCSO employees.

The Macomb County Sheriff CISM team is made up of 24 members of the MCSO. All members have completed approximately 35 hours of training to be certified with the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF) and registered with the Michigan Crisis Response Association (MCRA) as an internal CISM Team. The composite of the team consists of five command officers, nine sworn deputies, six dispatchers, and four correction deputies.

In addition to Peer Support, we have developed relationships with seven independent counselors that have specialized training and or experience with first responders. These counselors work with all county insurance and offer a wide range of services to fit our employee's needs.

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS



Macomb County Community Corrections is a community-based sanction and rehabilitative program aimed at relieving prison and jail overcrowding through Court-approved sentencing alternatives. Non-violent offenders are placed into community sanctions, rather than in jail or prison to allow for corrections space for more serious offenders.

Community Corrections has continued with all previously provided services to include Inmate assessments, pretrial risk and needs screenings, jail diversions to inpatient and community-based group programming, community service programs, pretrial supervision, drug testing, and electronic monitoring programs. All services continue through remote interviews and enrollment when possible as well as utilizing non-contact visiting booths to ensure Covid protocol safety for all. Community Corrections continues to assist Jail Administration daily with communication to courts for release based on needs assessments.

JAIL MINISTRY



The Macomb County Jail Ministry Team has two onsite chaplains that coordinate over 60 volunteers for religion-based counseling, services, and distribute literature weekly inside the facility. Bible Studies are conducted, and one-on-one ministries are provided continually for those who request them.

This past year, following COVID-19 restrictions, the ministry conducted 102 Bible Studies (with 671 inmates in attendance) and 924 contacts were made during the one-on-one meetings. The Chaplain's office also provides items for the inmates who are indigent: 452 envelopes, 27 bus tickets, 310 Bibles, 160 reading glasses and an innumerable amount of paper and pencils were given in the year of 2021.

The Chaplain's office also passes out Christmas Bags (containing Daily Bread, snacks, and candy) to every inmate and staff working during the Christmas season. An arm of the jail ministry has also provided countless coats, shoes, and pants to those who are leaving the jail and reintegrating back into society.



MAIL ROOM

In 2021 9,831 pieces of mail were screened / scanned thru the "Verovision" mail screener, a 14.24 % decrease from 2020. 18 drug detections were made – a 1700 % increase from 1 detection in 2020. All drug detections were forwarded to the Detective Bureau and SET team for a thorough investigation.

The 2021 investigations into narcotic laced mail resulted in five convictions of controlled substance delivery and furnishing contraband to a prisoner. The effectiveness of the mail screening process continues to be apparent in the reduction of drugs being smuggled in to MCJ.

The mail room also processed 1,946 books mailed in for inmates and 946 pieces of mail were rejected due to policy violations. The mail room also receives all administrative mail for the MCSO, to ensure safety of all incoming mail for the facility.

RESERVES



The Macomb County Sheriff's Office has a large, multi-faceted reserve deputy program. This volunteer workforce is managed by the department command officers. However, the hours donated by the civilian volunteers are reported to the office of the Administrative Lieutenant. These monthly statistics are compiled and forwarded to the Macomb County Emergency Management and reported under the "Volunteers in Police Services" (V.I.P.S.) program.

By capturing and reporting this information, the Macomb County Emergency Management Department applies for and qualifies grant funding under the LPT (Local Planning Team).

There are eight distinct units: A.C.E., ATV, Aviation, Cyber Crimes, Marine, Mountain Bike, Mounted, and Motorcycle. Two other volunteer groups who donate their time to serve the citizens of Macomb County are Senior Volunteers and Explorers. EXPLORERS



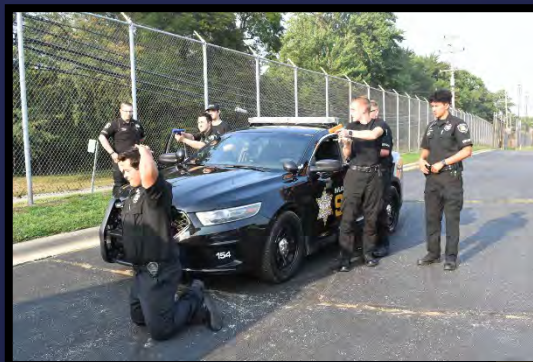
The post has been in existence since 1978. The post is affiliated with the Boy Scouts of America, Great Lakes Council. The post includes students from all over Macomb County and provides young adults (ages 14 - 20) with the opportunity to learn about careers in law enforcement. The program allows participants the opportunity to explore a career in law enforcement by working with the Sheriff's Office and other local law enforcement agencies. Although not all explorers pursue this career, it provides them with a better understanding of the Laws that govern our society. It also provides the explorers with "hands on" experience relating to the field of law enforcement and corrections.

The goal of the program is to educate young men and women about law enforcement through classroom instruction, practical exercises and community service. The curriculum is meant to help the explorer decide if the field of law enforcement is right for them, develop team building and provide a solid foundation for which they can build a future career.

In 2021, the explorers logged hundreds of hours in time volunteering in the community and in the classroom. Note: Explorers are not licensed law enforcement officers and do not have authority to make arrests.
